Shoes, Fuel Oil Registration Notes

"Unused shoes made in whole or in part of leather or with rubber soles, except water proof rubber footwear, soft and hard soled house and boudoir slippers, soft soled infant shoes and ballet slippers have been rationed since Sunday, February 7. Beginning Tuesday, Feb. 9, customers must present, and the trade must collect, stamp No. 17 from war ration book one for rationed shoes. This stamp is good for one pair of any kind of rationed shoes through June 15, and is transferable between members of a family living in the same household. Until further notice dealers may buy shoes without giving stamps but will owe ration currency for all such purchases and must keep all stamps and certificates collected if a customer has no stamp he can use, and can prove hardship if unable to buy a pair of shoes." This telegram was received yesterday morning.

"Later developments show that tennis shoes and wooden shoes are also to be rationed."

Registration of suppliers and dealers is set for February 12 and 13. They will register either at the Board or through their Distributor. Primary suppliers will register but will not receive inventory coupons.

Registration of consumers of fuel and diesel oil and kerosene will be held February 15, 16 and 17, from 8 to 8 p. m. The following elementary schools will be registration sites: Coquille (Washington Grade School), Powers, Bandon, Myrtle Point, Sitkum, McKinley, Fairview Arago and Bridge.

Federal Income Tax Information

Head of Family Exemption A single person, or a married person not living with husband or wife, is entitled to a personal exemption of \$1200 for the year if he can qualify as head of a family. A head of a family is "an individual who actually supports and maintains in one household one or more individuals who are closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage or by adoption, and whose right to exercise family control and provide for these dependent individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation."

Examples of head of family status would be a widower or widow who maintained a home for a dependent child, or a son who supported and maintained a household for a dependent father or mother. In order to meet the test of actual support and maintenance, The term "in one household" ordinarily means under one roof, but if a father is absent on business or a child or other dependent is away at school, or on a visit, the common home being still maintained, the head of family exemption would still apply. Where a parent is obliged to maintain his dependent children with relatives or in a boarding house while he lives elsewhere, the additional exemption may still apply. If, however, without necessity, the dependent continuously makes his home elsewhere, his benefactor is not the head of a family irrespective of the question of support.

The term "closely connected by blood relationship" applies to a person's progenitors and lineal descendants, to his brothers or sisters, whether by the whole or half blood, and to his uncles, aunts, nephews, and nieces. Irrespective of any legal obligation of the taxpayer to support such dependent relatives, a moral obligation to do so exists, and if the individual is actually supporting and maintaining in one household relatives of this degree he is entitled to head of family exemption.

A taxpayer is considered to be "closely connected by marriage" with his step-sisters and step-brothers, but whether his right to exercise family control and provide for these individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation must be decided upon the facts in the particular case. The same considerations apply to the status of a taxpayer because of support furnished to his father-in-law, mother-in-law, brother-in-law, and sister-in-law. First cousins by blood, and cousins of lesser degree, are not regarded as so "closely connected by blood relationship" as to give rise to a head of family exemption.

A legal guardian who may maintain and support in his home a dependent ward is not entitled to the personal exemption as head of a family if the ward was not connected with him by relationship of blood, marriage, or adoption; nor is a taxpayer entitled to exemption as head of a family by virtue of maintenance and support of a child not legally adopted.

Mrs. Tyrrell, one of Coquille's most popular singers with her exquisite coloratura soprano voice was never better. A surprise on the program was the reading by Miss Marianne Axtell of a radio broadcast, "A Word for the War," by Chet Huntley, broadcast last Dec. 6. Huntley says we are at war because the world was and is sick of an old and perfidious malady and the crisis is here.
