All who went from here on Tuesday evening to attend the dinner given by the Marshfield B. P. W. club, held at Westminster Hall, report having had a wonderful time. The Bay club had issued an invitation to all members of the Coquille club but only fourteen local people were able to attend.

Sheldon Sackett was the speaker and he discussed his observations of a nation at war, as a result of his swing around the circle during his recent trip to Washington and return. He told of the heavy travel, mentioned the matter of prices, rationing and help problems, and the activity in Washington, D. C. He listed as extremely able men who are working hard in our national capital, Stimson, McNary, Patterson, Knox and McNutt.

He used as a term the "pattern of victory" saying it is already apparent and spoke of the changing pattern of production.

His trip east had to do primarily with radio intelligence and he went on at length regarding the office of war information headed by Elmer Davis. He told of the thousands of problems arranged for short wave in 24 languages, and of the effort to educate both our allies and our enemy nations, giving out facts and

truths and yet guarding against information that could aid or comfort the enemy.

Of the problems of the future he said the U. S. A. would have to be prepared to police the world and in the league of nations there would be need for intelligence, learning, understanding and persistence, and an extreme amount of good will. His advice was for all to be well informed and open minded.

He said in conclusion that no one could make the swing around the circle and see democracy at work and not realize a vast giant had found strength to win this war. We must all have confidence in the moral vigor of the U. S., Mr. Sackett stated, and in closing added there is renewed faith in the U. S. and this nation has a great destiny.

There were about 35 present. Mrs. Amy Spargo, president of the Marshfield club introduced Mr. Sackett and also welcomed the Coquille guests. Ida Oerding responded. Inez Rover accompanied for the community singing with which Mrs. Chas. Stauff assisted.

The tables were decorated with bowls of acacia and decorations were especially dainty in appearance. A delicious course dinner was served which was greatly enjoyed by every one.
