

North Bend Wallops Coquille, 35 - 17

Last Tuesday night at North Bend the Coquille Red Devils quintet fell under the Bulldogs' scoring barrage, which gave North Bend its seventh straight county league win. The first quarter was a nip and tuck battle, with Coquille out in front, 5-4 at the whistle.

In the second frame the Bulldogs, who had been missing the hoop time after time in the first period, began to hit the hemp pretty fast and furiously and rolled up 20 points to the Devils' eight.

The scoring in the first frame started with a long one-hander by Snidow, but was quickly tied up 2-all by McCarthy with a lay-in. Coquille took the lead with a basket by Ray and broadened the lead when Mineau canned a gift shot. Snidow brought the Bulldogs up to one point behind with a howitzer from the side.

In the second quarter Martin put Coquille one more point ahead, 6-4, with a free try only to have the score tied 6 up when Miller potted a long one. North Bend took the lead when Ruppe made a free shot and Snidow sunk a basket. Coquille only made three points the second quarter, all of which were made from the foul line by Gosline, Martin and Ray. Snidow and Miller of North Bend found their ranges and threw in six points apiece and along with the rest of the team boosted the Bulldog score to 20 points.

In the third quarter the Bulldogs kept on rolling but the Red Devils kept right up with them as far as scoring was concerned. Coquille making eight points to North Bend's nine. Coquille's third frame scoring was divided between Gosline and Martin, Gosse making two points and Mart six. The score at the end of the third quarter was 29-18 in North Bend's favor.

For the fourth quarter the Bulldogs put in their second string and the Devils only let them have one point so they ran the first string back in and managed to get five points, while Coquille eked out a lone foul shot by Dick Ray. The final score reading was 35-17.

Walt Snidow took high game scoring honors with six baskets and a free toss for a total of 18 pounds. Ruppe was right behind with four baskets and three gift shots, making 11 points for him. Tom Martin sparked the Coquille offense with three field goals and a foul shot for seven points.

The Coquille B squad added its fourth game to their winning streak as they edged a victory from the North Bend B squad. Coquille led all the way, the quarterly score being 8-2, 12-6, 15-11, and 19-16, which was the final. DeNoma of Coquille captured high scoring honors with 11 points, followed by Bud Meek with eight to his credit.

Myrtle Point Trims Coquille, 35 - 19

Last Friday night at Myrtle Point, the Bobcats made it two out of three under the Coquille Red Devils, winning this game by almost the same score as the last one, the previous score being 37-19. From the opening score until early in the third quarter the Devils were leading, but then Sutphin and Belloni of Myrtle Point got hot and started to hit baskets from all angles and the Bobcats went way out ahead to a final count of 35-19. The Red Devil offense as well as its defense was slowed down considerably after the loss of Dick Ray who went to the showers with four fouls about half way through the second period. Deaver of the Bobcats also left the game with four personals in the fourth canto.

The game went more than two minutes before either team scored and then Dick Ray of Coquille, sunk a gift shot followed by McCarthy with a lay-in to put the Devils three points in the lead. Hatfield of Myrtle Point hit one to make the score 3-2. Then Martin and McCarthy hit the hemp pretty rapidly for six points, while Don Sutphin of the hosts made a couple of gift shots, and the quarter ended, 9-4.

In the second frame Tom Martin made Coquille's last basket of the game, the rest of the Devils score coming from foul shots. Myrtle Point sparked by Hatfield and Belloni, made eight points to Coquille's six, and the score at the half time was Coquille 15, Myrtle Point 12.

Taking the tip-off, Myrtle Point scored on a fast break and was trailing by one point in the opening minute of the third quarter. Sutphin put the Bobcats in the lead 15-18, with a long one hander from the corner. McCarthy tied it up 18-18 with a gift toss. Gosline fouled Deaver and Myrtle Point went into the lead only to be tied up again by Bill Mineau, 17-17. Just before the whistle Belloni hit the hoop for two points to give Myrtle Point the edge 19-17, at the end of the third period.

In the last quarter the scoring was really lopsided, Myrtle Point hitting the hemp for 18 points to Coquille's two. Don Sutphin who had been held to two foul shots the first half found his range and canned eight points for the Bobcats the last frame. Quite a few fouls were called Friday night. Fourteen on Coquille and 18 on Myrtle Point. Coquille had a little better average in foul shooting, making 9 out of 21, to Myrtle Point's 5 out of 15.

Don Sutphin and Hec Belloni of Myrtle Point tied for high game scoring honors with 12 points a piece. Martin was high for Coquille with 8 points, followed by McCarthy with 7.

The Coquille B squad came from a 12-8 half time lead to go to a 17-10 victory over the Myrtle Point B squad in the preliminary game. DeNoma was high for Coquille with five points, followed by Train and Kline with four apiece.
