Those designated will be notified by the Army authorities of the time and place of the regular mental and physical entrance examinations.

"Grades for all of the Naval Academy candidates have not been received yet," Congressman Ellsworth said, "but it is anticipated that these designations will be made in a few days."

Auditors Needed By Unemployment Com.

Accountants and auditors are needed by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission, which has announced new merit examinations next month. Applications must be made by March 12 to Prof. William Griffith, supervisor of examinations; 701 Spalding Building, Portland.

Field auditors and assistant accountants should have high school education supplemented by a course in accounting and some experience, while accounting clerks need only three years of clerical experience or record keeping.

Pay for the positions runs from \$125 to \$200 a month, depending on experience and length of service. Veterans will get a five-point credit in the examination, which are to be held late in March at Portland, Salem, Eugene, Marshfield, La Grande, Klamath Falls and Ontario.

"Battle of Midway" Added Attraction At Roxy Sun. to Tue.

"The Japanese Zero fighters roared in at you and you could see the flaming Red Sun on their fuselages. You drew in your breath sharply and held it."

"You could see their bombs drop and you could almost feel the concussion. The noise was like thunder and you thought each moment would be your last."

"Dense clouds of smoke from burning oil drifted across your dugout and then the Zero fighters boring in were lost to view. But you could hear them, and the explosion of bombs bursting nearby..."

So wrote a noted correspondent upon emerging from a special showing of "The Battle of Midway," the Navy Department film which was photographed under fire during the great naval battle. Slated to open Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Roxy Theatre, "The Battle of Midway" is unprecedented.

Commander John Ford, U. S. N. R., the former distinguished Hollywood director who made, "The Informer," "Grapes of Wrath," "How Green Was My Valley," and other motion picture epics, not only edited the film, but shot much of the footage while the battle was raging. He was, in fact, wounded by shrapnel early in the fighting as he perched atop a powerhouse, recording for posterity the most extraordinary on-the-scene account of actual battle ever released. A naval officer and an enlisted man took additional sea and air shots. Two others on Midway Island, had their cameras blown out of their hands by the impact of the concussion from a stick of Japanese bombs.

This great Naval film is released by the War Activities Committee of the Motion Picture Industry. The commentary is spoken by Henry Fonda, Donald Crisp, Irving Pichel and Jane Darwell, and the film is being distributed by 20th Century-Fox.
