

### Point Value To Be Marked On Foods

Customers buying of processed foods will be made easy by the requirement that every store mark the point value of each rationed item either on the package itself or on the shelf, bin, table or counter where it is displayed, the Office of Price Administration announced today.

This means that, when consumers start buying processed foods on March 1, they will find that each item or the shelf on which it rests is clearly marked with the proper point values.

The OPA suggests that consumers keep on hand a newspaper copy of the official table of point values, and a list of the weights of the most generally used rationed items. This information will make it possible for consumers to plan their point spending at home. Once they decide what particular items they want and they know the weight of each, it will be comparatively easy to locate the point values on the official table of point values and to budget points before going to market.

The bulk of purchases of canned fruits and vegetables may be made by using only 3 of the 16 columns in the official table of point values. This will make shopping for these foods under war ration book two much less complicated than a first glance at the official table of point values indicates.

OPA announced that in setting up the table, it was necessary to include weight columns for every size of can, jar or bottle used in the packaging of the rationed items, regardless of how infrequently that size might be used. Sixteen different weight groups were set up to cover more than 100 different sized containers which are in use at the present time. These 16 weight groups cover not only canned fruits and vegetables, but also all fruit and vegetable juices, frozen fruits and vegetables, soups, baby foods, and dried fruits.

Although more than 200 different items are included in the processed foods rationing program, most housewives buy only about 18 different items and these are usually packed in the No. 2 or No. 2½ cans.

Following is a list of the most widely sold canned foods with their approximate weights and point values

of the most common sizes:

### Must File Federal Income Tax Returns

J. W. Maloney, Collector of Internal Revenue, today said that the number of income tax returns filed by individuals is below the number which could reasonably be expected at this time. He again pointed out that an income tax return must be filed by every single person whose gross income from all sources was \$500 or more for 1942, and that an income tax return must be filed by every married person living with husband or wife if their combined gross income was \$1,200 or more for the year 1942.

The Collector said that possibly the delay in filing returns may be attributed in part to an erroneous impression that legislative proposals before the Congress, commonly known as "pay-as-you-go" plans, will relieve taxpayers from filing their income tax returns for 1942 and paying the first quarterly installment on or before March 15. He referred to a recent broadcast in which Secretary Morgenthau, Chairman Doughton of the House Ways and Means Committee, and Chairman George of the Senate Finance Committee made it clear that there is no pending tax plan which will relieve individuals of the necessity of filing income tax returns and paying the first quarterly installment on or before March 15. Chairman Doughton of the Ways and Means Committee stated the matter succinctly when he said:

"Let me make this fact clear: There has been no cancellation of taxes on the 1942 income. There has been no postponement of taxes on 1942 income. There has been no change in the time or place of payment. The first quarterly installment of the income tax is due on or before March 15."

The Collector urges taxpayers to file their returns as soon as possible. He said that if they should require assistance of members of his office in preparing their returns, they will be able to get assistance with the least delay by going to his office now rather than waiting until a few days before March 15. Taxpayers who made arrangements to file their returns promptly assist themselves as well as their Government. That taxpayers have everything to gain by early filing was emphasized by Senator George when he said:

"By paying your taxes on or before March 15th you have nothing to fear. Your payment will be credited to your account, reducing by so much the taxes you will later have to pay. This is an important consideration to keep in mind. The more you pay up now, the less you will have to pay in the future. You have everything to gain by paying; and you have everything to lose by not paying."

### Don't Slight Breakfasts

If there ever was a time for talking up breakfasts, it is the present. Almost every one of us is carrying an extra load of responsibility these days and we need an extra good start to put us on our toes bright and early. And we need a substantial breakfast also to see us through the entire morning without that mid-morning let down.

On these chill mornings, serve a piping hot main course like pancakes, waffles, or fried mush with heated syrup. Those favorites are better than the best alarm clock to get the family out of bed. Try it and see for yourself.

**PANCAKES**—Make them with prepared flour if time's an item, or with enriched flour for that extra Vitamin B. You can make the batter the night before with the exception of the melted shortening. Add it in the morning while the griddle is getting hot. I like to make my pancakes about the size of a dollar (an inflated dollar, maybe) and serve them in miniature stacks along with a pitcher of heated syrup. Have the breakfast all set and ready to eat as they come off the griddle.

**FRIED MUSH**—Here's an oldtimer worth repeating often. Make twice the family capacity for mush, corn meal, oatmeal, wheat cereal or any other favorite, and serve it the first morning as a hot cereal. Pack the rest in a loaf pan lined with waxed paper and put it in the refrigerator for the following morning. Come breakfast time again, take it out and slice it into ½-inch slices and fry in hot shortening until honey-brown on both sides. Speed them from the griddle to a hot plate and serve with heated syrup.
