

Coquille Loses Twice At Tournament

Friday Night.
Coquille 26, Myrtle Point 33.
Marshfield 18, North Bend 26.

Saturday Night
Coquille 22, Marshfield 37.
Myrtle Point 24, North Bend 46.

The Coquille Red Devils dropped both their games at the tournament in North Bend last Friday and Saturday night. The first night they lost a close game to Myrtle Point 33-26. The Red Devils went down under the Marshfield Pirates scoring attack the second night, 37-22.

Friday night the Coquille five took a quick lead over the Myrtle Point Bobcats and had a five point advantage over them at the end of the first quarter.

The second period the Bobcats, sparked by Peck Walton, rallied and started hitting the hoop for a fast and furious, nip and tuck, eight minute battle. The halftime score showed Coquille trailing by one point, 15-14.

During the third quarter the Bobcats stacked up eight points to the Red Devil's six counters and the score at the rest period was Myrtle Point 23, Coquille 20. Coquille's center, Tommy Martin, went to the showers with four fouls the third period, in attempting to stem the Bobcat attack.

The final frame the Devils canned six more points while the Bobcats potted 10, and the final score read Coquille 26, Myrtle Point 33. Bill Mineau, Coquille forward, left the game with four personals during the fourth period.

Dick Ray, Coquille guard, captured high game scoring honors and also high scoring laurels for the first night of the tournament with 13 points from six field goals and one free shot. Peck Walton of Myrtle Point followed closely with 12 points to his credit.

In the second game Friday night the North Bend Bulldogs came from behind the first quarter to go to a 25 to 18 victory over the Marshfield Pirates. The quarter score was 8 to 5, 12 to 9, 19 to 15 and 25 to 18. Huggins and Sneddon of Marshfield both left the game during the third quarter on four personal fouls. Snidow of North Bend was high for the game with 12 points. O'Neal sparked Marshfield with six counters.

Saturday Night
In the first game of the evening the Red Devils went down under the spirited Marshfield quintet attack, to the tune of 37-22.

The first quarter the Pirates were out ahead by a good margin 11 to 5. The second quarter the Red Devils doubled their score and the Pirates added 10 to theirs to give a halftime score of Marshfield 21, Coquille 10.

In the third period Marshfield, sparked by Jimmy O'Neal, gained another 10 points, while the Red Devil cagers made seven for a score of 31 to 17. Dick Ray, Coquille star, left the game in the third canto on four

fouls. The final frame the Devils mustered five points and the Pirates six for the final reading of—Marshfield 7, Coquille 22. Johaneson of Marshfield, also went to the showers with four personal fouls.

O'Neal of Marshfield, took high game scoring honors with five baskets and a gift shot for a total of 11 points. Glen Gosline was high point man for Coquille with nine points.

In the second game of the night, for the tournament championship, the favored North Bend Bulldogs waxed Myrtle Point's Bobcats 46 to 24. The quarterly scores were 9 to 6; 25 to 10; 34 to 16 and 46 to 24, the Bulldogs leading all the way. Hatfield of Myrtle Point left the game with four fouls the fourth quarter. Walt Snidow of the Bulldogs took high game honors with 19 points from eight baskets and three free shots. Snidow also took top tournament honors for both nights with a total of 31 points. He was followed by Weebly and Ruppe both of North Bend for game honors with 10 points apiece. Don Sutphin was high man for Myrtle Point with 11 points.

This defeat does not put Myrtle Point out of the running for the state tournament, however, as they are entitled to go to Medford to play the Medford quintet Tuesday night. The winner of this game will enter as the fourth team in the tournament at Ashland, March 5 to 6. North Bend will also participate in this tournament which decides the District No. 7 representative in the state meet at Salem.

The officials, Robins and Siegman, poked an all tournament team which was announced at the end of the second game. They were Walt Snidow, North Bend; Jim O'Neal, Marshfield; Don Sutphin, Myrtle Point; Dick Ray, Coquille and Rudy Ruppe of North Bend. Honorable mention was given Tom Murdock, North Bend, and Sig Johaneson of Marshfield.

Captain Ed Hatfield of Myrtle Point was presented with the tournament hall and captain Walt Snidow of North Bend the trophy.

Humphreys To Start Plant At Once

(Western World)

The Humphreys Gold Corporation, which recently announced that a primary concentrating plant will be built at the lagoon property north of Bullards for the purpose of working beach sands for chromic oxide ore, began activities in that direction during the past week.

Among the first jobs is the building of an access road from the lagoon to intersect the Krome Corporation road now being built by the state under direction of the federal Public Roads Administration. The same federal administration will build the connecting link for Humphreys so that primary concentrates can be trucked to the secondary plant at Beaver Hill north of Coquille. Engineer Emery of the PRA arrived during the week to take charge of the project. Rights-of-way are being obtained.

Another preliminary job is construction of an electric power line to connect the Humphreys plant site with the line that will feed the Krome Corporation primary plant. The connecting link will be built by Humphreys, with W. M. Siprell as foreman in charge. Mr. Siprell has arrived to start the work. A carload of supplies for the line is en route and should arrive in the county this week.

Humphreys have taken over two local buildings. The American Legion hall is being converted into office quarters with temporary partitions dividing the main room into several rooms. The north end of the International Cedar building will be used as a storage warehouse. It is being

equipped with tables and bins for mechanical parts. A model storage tank has also been built there in which experiments are being carried on with beach sand to determine the best methods of handling certain phases of the concentrating operations.

D. G. Brown, one of the men in charge for Humphreys, spent several days here from Sacramento, Calif., during the week but has since returned south. He will soon make his headquarters here. C. J. Bastedo, superintendent of construction and operation, is expected here from Sacramento within a few days and plans to establish headquarters in Bandon.

Leonard Farr Commissioned A Second Lieutenant

Leonard C. Farr, 21, army corporal, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester C. Farr, of Marshfield, last week completed training at the Medical Replacement Center at Camp Barkeley, Texas, in the Center Officer Candidate school and was commissioned second lieutenant in the Medical Administrative Corps. He was a student in civilian life, having graduated from Coquille High and attended University of Oregon three years. He was general manager of Students' Cooperative there.

His 12 weeks' training course completed, new Medical Administrative Corps officers, chosen for commissions by evidence of their qualities of leadership and command, will now assume the non-medical functions heretofore performed by Medical and Dental Corps officers, thus releasing the latter for purely professional duties with troops. Duties the MAC's will take over include medical supply, training, personnel, and other administrative jobs.

Upon completion of a ten-day graduation leave, the newly-commissioned second lieutenant will report to his first station assignments.
