Myrtle-Lined Hiway Coquille To Myrtle Point Suggested

to your community and the state as a whole never came to me so vividly as it did last week when I drove from Coquille to Roseburg via Myrtle Point on my way to Salem. Is Myrtle Point conscious of its myrtle value? There isn't another such setting in the Nation. It isn't my thought to buy three hundred strips either side of the highway between Coquille and Myrtle Point where the land is under cultivation or in pasturage. All such lands should remain in private ownership because it is through these lands that you derive your tax moneys for the upkeep of your county. The people who own these lands should be brought into a community co-operative movement wherein these myrtle tracts would be protected by them. A form of a tree lease could be given to the state whereby the trees would be cared for by the state. If such a thing could be brought about, I would have a man, or men, on the ground the next day, trimming, planting, caring for the same. Hill areas, ground not adaptable to farming but suitable to myrtle planting, I would acquire. Somewhere between the two cities, I would select a tract which would be adaptable for the making of a state myrtle park. I would prefer a young tract that could be moulded into a show place. With the myrtle waysides both north and south there would be something that even Oregonians would talk about, let alone the rest of the world.

Both cities have Chambers of Commerce, Service Clubs and, I believe, Roadside Councils and Garden Clubs. Further, I believe you have a County Recreational Committee.

I feel that these organizations will be favorable to the foregoing plan. Through these organizations I feel the farmers living along the highway between the cities could be brought into the general movement. The land would be theirs, the use of it would not be changed, all we want from them would be the protection of the trees. You have something that contains greater values than metals that glitter, stones that sparkle. The spiritual side abides in us all. A side that is being trampled by mankind throughout a maddened world. Destruction on all sides. Why not something constructive like the foregoing to freshen one's being after laying down the morning paper?

A community drive in the promotion of this proposed project could be questioned at this particular time. An all-out war effort by manpower and resources is asked by both Nation and State. Diversional objects tend to divert from the matter in hand. However, both Nation and States are planning at this time for postwar projects. Could not this myrtle wayside have the consideration of a small committee of citizens representing the interested communities in formulating a plan of procedure of cooperation to consider at this time boundaries, acquisition, administration and maintenance?

A world today disseminates nothing but destruction for man's mind to ponder. There must be a counteractive thought of something constructive which is necessary for proper balancing. Surely this myrtle wayside carries the creative action of the Maker which composes our own beings? What other Shrine is there to look to for tomorrow's better world? You have something so big in your midst that you can't see it. Awaken to your opportunity and complete a tri-color of Cheese, Breeze and Recreation!
