Ray, F. C. Hudson, C. A. Rietman and O. B. Harriman being named as the committee, with E. T. Stelle and Drue Cunningham as alternates.

A letter was read from the League of Oregon Cities, which told of those cities in Oregon now operating under the city manager form of administration. The salaries paid range from \$2400 to \$4200 per year, but one question put up to the League of officials was not answered. The question was as to whether the employment of a city manager increased or decreased municipal expenses and by how much.

The council approved a tentative order given for the purchase of flax paper and asphalt preparation for repairing the roof of the city hall and the buildings at the distribution reservoir this summer. The material will cost \$422.

Although the city has invested in Lots 1 and 2, in block 41—in the bottom east of the Henry street bridge—the sum of \$150 for taxes and improvements it was felt advisable to accept the \$100 offer made by Sam Epperson for the two.

Lots 11 and 12, Block 36, also in the gulch, were sold to Geo. Taylor and Wm. Knox for \$138.

It was reported that the city's fire department has just completed the formation of a new organization, with constitution and by-laws, a report on which will be ready for the next council meeting.

Permission was given the Krome Corporation, which has taken a lease on Fred Schaer's shop across First street, south of the Safeway store, to park three of their trucks nightly on the paving along the curb from there up to Hall street. The company intends using the shop for repair work until their repair shop out near Beaver Hill Junction is ready for use, and the building is not large enough to house their entire fleet of trucks.
