Arago News

The death of Edward J. Myers, which occurred at his home in Arago last Wednesday, April 7, at about 11:30 p. m., came as a shock to his family and friends. Although he had been in failing health for the past three years, he was in cheerful spirits all the day and spent most of it visiting with his brother-in-law, Frank Lane, who spent the day with Mr. and Mrs. Myers and who did not leave for his own home until about 8:00 p. m. After that Mr. and Mrs. Myers remained up to listen to the nine o'clock news broadcast, before retiring for the night. Some little time after retiring Mr. Myers started to cough and then he started to hemorrhage and the end came in just a short time, about one-half hour.

He was born in Minnesota and came to Coos county when he was a small child and had lived nearly all his life on a ranch near Arago, except for two years which were spent in Umatilla county. On account of poor health he sold his ranch on the river bank about three years ago and moved into Arago.

He was married in 1896 to Ida McClellan and to this union were born four children: Oliver Myers, of Myrtle Point; Mrs. Stanley Halter, of Arago; Mrs. Lawrence Barklow and Mrs. Wayne Woodward, both of Portland. He united with the Arago church about 1925 or 1926 and had been a true and faithful Christian character all his life. He was 69

years of age at his passing.

He leaves to mourn his passing: his wife Ida Myers; his son and his three daughters; two sisters, Mrs. T. Murray Hazen, of Tacoma, Wash., and Mrs. Jesse Clinton, of Myrtle Point, and two brothers, John Myers, of Myrtle Point, and Ralph Myers, of Springfield, Ore., and one grandchild, Gerald Woodward, who is enlisted in the Air Corps Reserves and who recently went to Texas for training. One brother, the late L. A. Myers, of Arago, passed away about ten months ago. Besides the above mentioned he leaves a host of other relatives and numerous friends who will miss his cheery greetings and smile. He was loved and respected by all who knew him and the Arago community has been saddened by his passing.

Funeral services were held at the Schroeder Brothers' Mortuaries in Myrtle Point last Saturday afternoon at two o'clock, with Rev. J. W. Barnett and Rev. M. M. Stern, of Myrtle Point, officiating. Music was furnished by the Arago ladies. Interment was in the Norway cemetery.
