Words of Cheer

The Peace is going to bring a great many problems to the American people. Many obstacles will have to be hurdled. It is going to take a bit of doing to provide jobs in peacetime pursuits for the millions of men now in our armed forces and the additional millions engaged in war production. Therefore, it is encouraging to know that one, at least, of our outstanding industrial leaders looks to the post-war period with a confidence not born of wishful thinking but based on a sound analysis of the actual conditions.

The house of du Pont of Wilmington, Delaware, is one of the great leaders of American industry. Founded in 1801 by E. I. du Pont, newly arrived in America the previous year, this company has manufactured powder for every war in which America has since engaged. But transcending its contribution to the United States in times of war, have been its contributions during times of peace - its research, development in the fields of chemistry, plastics, etc.

Under the able guidance of Lamont du Pont and other officials, the company has continued to grow, to make an even greater contribution to the welfare of the American people and to the maintenance of the American Way of Life. This industrial executive recently in a radio address for transmission to American troops abroad, held forth great hopes for post-war America. He said:

"After the war we will have at our command in America, ten, fifty, a hundred times what we had before, chiefly new materials. American factories will be producing almost seven times more aluminum than in 1939, and 100 times more magnesium, which weighs less than aluminum. We will

be making almost as much rubber by chemical processes as was grown annually in all the world before the war."

Mr. du Pont went on to say that the American aviation industry would be able to produce in a single year almost double the number of planes that were made throughout its history up to 1940. He prophesied that some of the planes will be four times the size of the largest pre-war planes, and that the nation will be dotted with huge air fields. He predicted that great chemical plants would stand ready to turn out new plastics, new paints, new textile fibres, new fertilizers, and a hundred and one other new materials in quantities undreamed of only a few years ago.

"There will be wood that won't burn; glass that won't break; window screens that contain no wire; and machine bearings that contain no metal," Mr. du Pont added.

He forecasts there would be better and cheaper homes, finer and less costly automobiles, radios and refrigerators - a greater abundance of almost everything that adds to the comfort and satisfaction of living - that all of these will be awaiting the homecoming soldier when the war is won. Undoubtedly when he said cheap-homes, etc., Mr. du Pont meant that these comparisons must be construed as Values, not money prices; that is, if we experience inflation even in moderate degree, one would not expect any article to sell for less dollars, but it would be cheaper in terms of hours worked to earn the purchase price.

In conclusion Mr. du Pont said: "Spurred to extraordinary efforts by the extraordinary needs of the past few years, in many fields, we have gone ahead 30 to 50 years as measured by the old rate of development." We interpret this "old rate of development" to mean the rate of development over the course of the last 150 years.

While in this particular radio address Mr. du Pont did not say so, we feel certain he agrees with us that his predictions can only come true if the American System of Free Enterprise is given full sway, with government merely umpiring and not participating as a player in the game of business. Verily, this message of one of America's great leaders can be called, "Words of Cheer."
