American dollars which run off to some cozy shelter to hide while American boys are dying to defend our cities and towns from destruction and invasion will face a rising demand from all classes of patriotic citizens to come out and fight.

Millions of workers who now are buying War Bonds regularly out of current income must lend extra money to their government during the Second War Loan campaign (which started April 12).

In recognition of the spirit of sacrifice which is sweeping over the land as our troops swing into offensive action in Africa and await the signal for a landing in Europe, the Treasury Department is offering a series of government bonds to fit every pocketbook.

No matter whether Americans buy the familiar Series E Bonds or 2 1/2 per cent bonds or 2 per cent bonds or tax certificates, they will be doing their part to make the Second War Loan drive a success.

Regulation For Sale Of Used Trucks

The local War Price and Rationing Board has just received a copy of the new Maximum Price Regulation governing ceiling prices on used trucks. The regulation will become effective April 26, and establishes prices at certain percentages of the original factory list price, depending on age and condition of the truck. Dealers and all other persons interested in the regulation may call at the local Board office for information. An additional supply of the regulation will soon be available for distribution. The regulation covers all sales by a dealer or by any individual.

Coffee Glass Jars Can Be Used For Home Canning

Housewives throughout the country who have been the subject of husbandly ridicule for saving those empty glass coffee jars and metal caps "just in case," today have the last laugh.

One of the country's largest glass manufacturers has announced production of a new type of thrifty lid designed to convert regulation coffee jars into ideal containers for home-preserving.

Simultaneously, the Consumer Division of OPA has announced that in the future many containers will come equipped with paper covers and urges prospective home-canners to retain all screw caps that will fit the opening of the standard home-preserving coffeejar. The new canning lids are used in cooperation with the screw-on caps and housewives are urged to build up a backlog against the day when the screw caps are no longer available.

The lids are designed in accordance with government regulations and are made of tin-plate and lined with a rubber compound. Millions of them are now being manufactured for distribution to grocery stores late in April. It is expected they will do much to help overcome the shortage of home-canning jars during the coming season.
