### 4-H Club Work To Be Exhibited

Plans for 4-H Club exhibits this spring and fall were discussed during a special meeting for all county local leaders at the Marshfield city hall recently, according to Mrs. Dorothy Bishop, home demonstration agent in charge of the home economics clubs, and James Bishop, assistant county agent in charge of the agricultural clubs. L. J. Allen, assistant state club leader, was present and gave many fine and helpful suggestions relative to exhibits and club demonstrations.

Exhibits in Clothing, Cooking, Room Improvement, Forestry, Woodworking and Birdstudy will be made at the Bunker Hill School on May 29 for the Coos Bay area, and at Riverston May 22 for the Coquille Valley area. Judging of exhibits will begin at 10:00 a. m. The exhibits will be on display to the public until 3:30 p. m. It was decided by the group that prize ribbons should be provided for all winners, and awards in defense stamps to be made to the winners in the fall. Winners will be eligible to participate in the state contests.

The importance of each club training a demonstration team was discussed with interest by the leaders. The making of special awards to the highest scoring club team was suggested.

Exhibits to be shown in the fall will be Canning, Gardening, Livestock and Crops. The dates for these fall exhibits will not be set until later. Definite plans are being made, however, to make it possible for members of Dairy, Beef, Sheep, Pig and Poultry clubs to exhibit their animals this fall. All 4-H members who are carrying individual projects will be eligible to exhibit also.

4-H Club work can provide a profitable as well as an important and interesting diversion for boys and girls, Mr. Allen stated. A program is being worked out for each exhibit place by a committee of local leaders.
