Coos County Women Delighted With Mrs. Eleanor McAdoo

with her mission to inform women that the urgent need of their help in the great task of raising money for war needs is of paramount importance. This she did with a charming grace of delivery, an informality of manner, in which the different approaches to her subject sometimes resulted in almost dramatic changes in her mood. The security angle and anti-inflation she gave as the best arguments for selling war bonds. That taxation and the savings of the people are the only way to prevent a destructive run-away inflation was given as positive and was discussed at length.

How to circumvent an attitude on the part of the individual who hesitates to invest in war bonds on ground of his or her belief that such great waste exists in national affairs was another subject of discussion by Mrs. McAdoo. Her answer was that all war is waste, that we were not ready for war and in the frantic effort to make ready, waste resulted but Washington knows this and is trying to do something about it, Mrs. McAdoo stated.

Mrs. Albert Powers, Jr., county chairman of sales of war bonds and stamps through women's organizations, was in charge and presided at the luncheon. Her handling of the organizing of the county committees and their efficiency in functioning successfully was a matter of comment from both Mrs. McAdoo and Mrs. Saldie Orr Dunbar, of Portland, who accompanied the guest speaker to Coos county. Mrs. Dunbar is associate administrator of the Oregon staff in charge of women's activities.

Mrs. Dunbar was called on to follow Mrs. McAdoo and made further remarks in the interest of the second war loan drive now under way and expressed greetings to the many friends present with whom she has become acquainted during the 28 years she has been coming to the county.

Before the speakers were introduced Mrs. Powers introduced community chairmen from Marshfield, North Bend, Coquille, Myrtle Point, Bandon and Powers. Each was given time for a few words. Coquille's sales since April 1 until April 24 made by chairmen of seven organizations, amounted to \$42,161.52. This announcement was made by Mrs. Wernich who asked that Mrs. Fred Houston, Coquille Womens Club chairman had during the 23 days sold almost \$23,000 worth of bonds and stamps herself. Mrs. Houston was asked to stand and was given a good hand.

Several other women helping with the drive were called on including Mrs. W. S. Nicholson, assistant to Mrs. Powers; Mrs. H. L. Maloney, in charge in Marshfield of booths; Elsie Ayres, radio chairman for Women's Division; Honorable Stella Cutlip, head of the Victory Center, in Marshfield; Mrs. Mel Johnson, head of Women at War, and others.

Music was furnished by a girl sextette from the high school, with trumpet obligato by Forest Webb. Miss Diane Powers, daughter of the Albert Powers just dismissed last week from McAuley hospital, was among the group making up the sextette. Their hit number was "I Pledge Allegiance to Our Flag."

Mrs. Geo. A. Larson, head of the Garden Club, was thanked for the lovely decorations, red tulips and lilacs in spreading arrangements as table centerpieces.

Many women over the county were disappointed in not being able to attend for lack of accommodations and especially was this the case in Coquille. Only the first fifteen reservations could be assured places at the tables though, as it happened, all of the seventeen who went from here were seated. Mrs. Nicholson stated the committee did not anticipate the response would be so large.

County Court's Reply To Assessor Forrest's Letter

rest's extra girls, not steady employees but solely employed as extra help, had been receiving pay at the rate of \$3.00 per day. Mr. Forrest requested a raise and he was told by the County Court that any reasonable raise would be granted, provided there were sufficient funds in his budget to sustain it, but that at that time the Court would approve a raise to \$4.00 per day, which was granted. Then, arbitrarily and without consulting the court Mr. Forrest raised two of his extra girls to a flat \$120.00 per month rate, which was done without any authorization whatever by the County Court. Although, to save Mr. Forrest embarrassment this rate was paid for two months and he was definitely advised that it would not be paid thereafter, but that his extra help would all have to be paid at the rate established, namely, \$4.00 per day. The Attorney General in his opinion says, "It appears after these employees had rendered their services for the month of February the County Court refused to approve payment of their regular compensation but restricted the monthly salary of each employee to \$88.00. As a result the two employees resigned." It is true that court did refuse to allow the \$120.00 per month and insisted that the pay be restricted to \$88.00 which was in fact the regular compensation previously agreed at when the Assessor requested from the Court the increase from the \$3.00 per day rate. Upon direct questioning by the Court as to whether or not the Assessor requested that his girls resign Mr. Forrest stated that he refused to answer as to whether he did or did not request their resignation in order to force the Court to grant the increase. On further direct questioning, when he was asked if it was true that he did not make such a request he repeated that he did not admit that either.

To continue with the Attorney General's opinion, he quotes from Oregon Laws as follows, "The Assessor may appoint such deputies, assistants or clerks as may be necessary, but the number and compensation thereof shall be determined by the County Court of said county." This Court has endeavored at all times to fully cooperate with the County Assessor. However, you will note under his budget expenditures that he has spent money for services for which no funds were provided in his budget, and further that he has expended substantially his entire budget in three-fourths of the budget period, leaving a full quarter for him to operate without funds unless additional funds may be made available by the Court from other sources. We should like to compare expenditures of the Assessor's office over the past several years.

In 1938 there was budgeted \$8,120.00. There was spent \$7876.46.

In 1939 there was budgeted \$9,485.00. There was spent \$9007.33.

In 1940 there was budgeted \$8,780.00. There was spent \$8697.55.

In 1941, the year in which Mr. Forrest took office, there was budgeted \$8,860.00. There was spent \$10,364.95.

For the first six months of 1942, there was budgeted \$5,085.00. There was spent \$8,739.39.

For the present fiscal period, 1942-43, there was budgeted \$13,415.00. There was spent in nine months \$13,287.36.

It may readily be seen that since Mr. Forrest has held office he has overspent every budget under which he has operated. The County Court has improved the physical appearance in his office, has complied with every reasonable request that the Assessor has ever made, and fully intend continuing the policy of full cooperation with his office. However, this Court has felt that the public has not had a full and complete picture of the true relationship between the two offices as contained in the letter that Mr. Forrest published sometime ago, and in the press reports of the Attorney General's opinion with reference to the Court insisting that Mr. Forrest's extra help be paid at the rate established in agreement between the Court and Mr. Forrest.

The only reason for asking the Attorney General's opinion as to our authority to provide additional moneys for Mr. Forrest's office so that it may operate for the next three months is purely one of staying within the law governing expenditure of money which carried with it the approval of the Court as fiscal agent for the county.
