

### C. H. S. Placed Fourth At Eugene

Wally Moore and Jack McCracken qualified at the No. 4 district track meet in Eugene last Friday to enter the state track meet and with their coach, Spike Leslie, will be at Salem tomorrow for the Oregon high schools event.

Wally won the 200-yard low hurdles last Friday in 24.4 seconds, breaking the district record by one-tenth of a second.

Jack won the 100-yard dash in 10.4 seconds and the 220 in 23.4 seconds, but did not crack a previous record.

Coquille had but five men in the meet, while all the schools which ranked higher and most of them in the lower brackets had 20 men on the field. Twenty schools had teams participating.

The Red Devil quintet took fourth place at the meet with 22 points. Marshfield High won the event with 48 1/2 points, taking four firsts. Cottage Grove took second place with 32 points and Eugene, third, with 25. All five of the Red Devils scored points, the three firsts giving them 15.

Alborn, who placed third in the javelin toss threw the spear a few inches over 145 feet. Hurst, third in the shot put, hit the 41 feet, 9 inches, mark, and Willey was fifth in the mile run.

#### R. N. A. Purchased Two And A Half Million Of War Bonds

Additional government bonds in the amount of \$2,500,000 have been purchased by Royal Neighbors of America, giving the society a total of \$5,084,750 invested in United States securities, according to a report received by Mae Waggoner, recorder of Camp No. 2972, of Coquille, Oregon. The society's purchase of \$2,500,000 worth of government war bonds at this time serves as a part of two patriotic projects. One is the Royal Neighbors Mother's Day war bond campaign and the other is the Second War Loan drive of the treasury department.

In view of the society's campaign to sell war bonds and stamps among its 5,846 camps and 500,600 members, this investment has been designated as "The Royal Neighbors Mother's Day Purchase of Government War Bonds." The amount of the purchase is con-

sidered a fitting tribute from the society to mothers of the nation for their sacrifices and contributions to the war effort. The society's campaign opened March 1 and closes May 31, 1943.

#### High School Buys \$259 In Bonds Instead Of Awards

The Coquille high school students voted last week to eliminate the

usual precious metal awards which have been heretofore given for various activities, until after the war, and the \$259 thus saved has been invested in war bonds. The activities for which awards have previously been given are the Girls League, Debate, Extemporaneous Speaking, Band, Laurel and Hi Times.

### Ways with Fresh Produce

Fresh vegetables and plenty of them keep the nutritional score of your menu high. Vitamins and minerals are really important to the diet now. And fresh vegetables are rich storehouses of these food essentials.

To conserve and profit by these necessary food elements, serve vegetables uncooked in salads or cook them quickly. Vary them too, for appetite interest. Even the seemingly unglamorous vegetables can be turned into dishes of delight.

- ... **Beets in Dressed Sauce**—Make a thickened sauce using 2 tbsps. shortening, 2 tbsps. flour, 1/4 cup beef liquid, and salt and pepper to taste. When sauce is slightly thickened, add 1 tsp. sugar and 1/4 cup vinegar and bring to boil. Pour over hot, sliced beets.
- ... **Raw Beet Salad**—Combine 2 cups coarsely shredded, raw beets and 1 cup chopped peanuts with a bit of lemon juice and salad dressing.
- ... **Cabbage Chop Suesy**—Toss together 3 cups shredded cabbage, 1 cup sliced celery and leaves, 1 large, sliced onion, 1/4 cup green pepper and salt and pepper to taste. Fry covered in a small amount of shortening 5 to 10 minutes, no longer, stirring occasionally.
- ... **Spley Cabbage Slew**—Grind cabbage and mix with vinegar, salt, pepper and sugar. For variety, add equal parts ground carrots and cauliflower, mix with salad dressing, press into terrapin to mold, and unroll on cabbage leaves.
- ... **Scalloped Carrots**—Scalloped carrots alone or with potatoes and onions. Top with cheese if you like.
- ... **Pioneer-Style Baked Onions**—Bake large onions, whole with outer skins and all just as you would potatoes. Serve by brushing open, and seasoning with salt, pepper, and butter.
- ... **Paranip-Apple Casserole**—Arrange alternate layers of cooked, mashed parsnips and sweetened applesauce. Sprinkle each layer with a bit of brown sugar, nutmeg and lemon juice. Top with buttered bread crumbs and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. Serve as a vegetable.
- ... **Branched Turnip or Rutabaga Patties**—Boil turnips or rutabagas, mash, season and form into patties. Roll in bread crumbs and fry quickly in hot shortening.
- ... **Cauliflower Fritters**—Dip pre-cooked cauliflowerettes in beaten egg, then flour, then egg again. Fry until golden brown in hot shortening.
