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Auto Liability Insurance Not Compulsory

Under new law to become effective June 10, 1943, The safety responsibility act requires that any driver involved in an accident that results in injury, death or property damage must within 10 days present proof of \$11,000 worth of financial responsibility or have his driver's license and car registration cancelled. At any time afterwards his license and registration would be revoked immediately if his insurance policy expired or his bond was

The act applies whether or not the driver was at fault, exception being allowed only in the cast of a car legally parked at the time of the accident. After two years, if the driver paid no damages and no suit was brought against him, he would be permitted to drive and own a car again.

Now the average citizen would rather play safe and place insurance on his or her car than to take a chance with FATE. With a law like the above in force there is not much choice. BUT IT IS NOT COMPULSORY. The cost for \$15,000 insurance is not high. From \$14.00 to \$16.25 per year—depending on the kind of Gas Ration Book you have.

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
