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Under new law to become effective June 10, 1943,

The safety responsibility act requires that any driver involved in an accident that results in injury, death or property damage must within 10 days present proof of \$11,000 worth of financial responsibility or have his driver's license and car registration cancelled. At any time afterwards his license and registration would be revoked immediately if his insurance policy expired or his bond was cancelled.

The act applies whether or not the driver was at fault, exception being allowed only in the cast of a car legally parked at the time of the accident. After two years, if the driver paid no damages and no suit was brought against him, he would be permitted to drive
