The Salem Sampler

Another chapter in the feud between the Administration and the press was written when Senator Bankhead introduced a bill requiring the United States government to spend a large sum of money for advertising in the small newspapers of the nation. The bill does not give any reason for advertising nor does it say what is to be advertised. It is frankly an attempt to gain the goodwill of the small newspaper through liberal gifts of the taxpayers' money.

Coming at a time when the small newspaper's lot is a hard one because of restricted business advertising, it dangles an almost irresistible bait before their hungry eyes. When the tax money is being lavishly distributed to others why should not the poor struggling editor grab off his share?

Be it said to the everlasting credit of the press that the bill does not have their support and therefore is probably doomed in committee. It seems to have only increased the friction between press and Administration, instead of lessening it. The genial senator who fondly sponsored it must be badly disappointed.

Here is another illustration of the truism that the safety of our cherished freedom of speech lies in the unimpeachable integrity and complete independence of the press. The latter is the bulwark behind which democracy functions, secure from the floods of fascism, communism, and state socialism that eternally threaten to engulf it.

Here is proof that those who operate our small newspapers are worthy of the trust and confidence of the public. They have been subjected to severe tests of honor and courage and have come through with flying colors to prove their right to be the standard-bearers of democracy and freedom.

The nation waits anxiously for the enactment of the new tax bill. After having a hybrid creation dumped in their lap by a face-saving House, the Senate finance committee has brought forth a better bill which makes the transition to current payments much easier and should greatly reduce delinquencies.

To say that the Ruml plan actually "forgives" taxes is not true. The only forgiveness of taxes open to any of us in this generation is when death comes. The astronomical national debt means that every citizen of the nation, rich or poor, will have to give Uncle Sam a very large portion of his earnings as long as he lives. No longer can the tax burden be carried mainly by any single group. Everyone must pay his share and no amount of scheming or demagogic political legerdemain can alter the fact nor evade the responsibility. Therefore the sooner we all get our shoulder to the wheel by putting into effect the pay-as-you-go plan the better off we will be.

While I was aware that widespread tax delinquency existed among factory workers, I was surprised.

prised to find that many mid-west farmers had thrown up their hands in defeat after a hopeless tussle with the intricacies of tax forms and had failed to file returns. It is in order to revise and simplify the forms so that an ordinary man can understand them and fill them out correctly. The critical eye of Congress is on this situation and it would not be surprising if the U. S. Treasury were compelled to revamp their entire tax-form schedule.

The tax program given to the press by Senator George as his own personal view has attracted wide attention because of his great influence in Congress. A southern democrat and a conservative, the senator has won the support of many republican members by his sane views on economical matters. One of the main planks in his platform is the setting up of a post-war cushion for business firms to cover any slack period while changing to peace-time manufacture. This cushion is to take the form of a reserve in cash or war-bonds to be earmarked and kept intact for that particular purpose. It is to be deductible as an operating expense.

The need for this sort of thing is great. It is essential is we are to preserve the free enterprise system. No amount of government spending can take the place of private business in bringing prosperity and progress. Senator George acknowledges this in his tax program. It is to be hoped that his views will prevail.

Like fleas on a dog, such goings-on as the current R Street episode are indigenous to a bureaucratic set-up. The centralization of supreme authority in Washington sets the stage. Vested interests, working through clever agents, furnish the actors.

It is said that official Washington can be lured anywhere by the prospects of a square meal. The long list of distinguished visitors to R Street tends to confirm this. As the investigation follows out the roots of this establishment, even some of those close to the President become involved and take their turn squirming on the witness stand.

While it is difficult to prove any ulterior motive behind the lavish entertainments, the fact remains that contracts were secured and certain advantages granted as a result of contacts between the invited guests. And even though nothing is proved and everyone goes scot-free, the publicity will discourage future operators of these joints by making it hard to induce high officials to run the risk of attending. An offensive odor as of decayed fish pervades the scene.

It looks as if Congress has at last decided to run the show itself. Some emptying of old garbage and sweeping under rugs is called for. Congress is evidently not going to trust this to the hired hands but is grabbing the broom and mop itself. A mighty healthy omen for the future and an ominous warning for political fatcats.

Wood has been looked upon as a temporary building material. It is commonly used for cheap construction of the "expendable" type. When the public thinks in terms of permanency and long life, it conceives of structures built of masonry and steel. No one regards a wooden home as long-lived.

Yet when I visited my old home town, I actually saw fourteen homes that were built of Michigan pine and well all over 100 years old. And they are in excellent repair and being lived in. Their owners have from time to time added such things as plumbing and electrical fixtures to keep pace with modern improvements. But little or no major repairs to the original structure have been necessary. One thing in common to all of them was the huge kitchen calling for miles of travel by the housewife in her daily tasks. Our forefathers were not overly solicitous for the comfort of their wives. Those kitchens were built for utility and not for convenience. Human labor was cheap and plentiful, then.

The point is that those homes, now more than a century old, are still good for many years to come. Wood, properly used, is just as long-lived as any other building material and is far more flexible in use. Alterations can be made very cheaply and simply in wooden houses. Insulation from heat and cold is easier and more practicable. Wood is not subject to stresses set up by extremes of heat and cold and can be worked by almost anyone. Taking these things into consideration, a wooden house is a pretty good investment for anyone to make. But it needs to be protected with reasonable care from damage by the elements just as a structure made of any other material must be protected from time to time.

Westerners can be thankful that their cities are oil or wood heated. They have none of that dingy, lack-lustre look that characterizes the big mid-western cities. Had occasion to spend some time

in Chicago, first visit in 17 years. Noticed that the old brick and wood block pavements were still in service. The wood-blocks stand up surprisingly well under rubber-tired traffic and help to deaden traffic noises.

The present taxi-cab fleet has a peculiar foreign look and the cabs ride very comfortably over the rubble pavements.

Noted several new street cars, stream-lined and low slung. They have tremendous pick-up and braking power. Imagine they would constitute serious traffic hazard to autoists not accustomed to them. They don't act right for street cars.

Street traffic is very much lighter because of gas rationing. Quite a few horse-drawn vehicles are in use. Practically no private car traffic on down-town streets. Busses, trucks and taxis make up the bulk of daytime travel. Noted that the huge parking area on the lake front near the Loop district was only one-third filled.

The huge masses of brick and stone that make up the Loop had the same old dingy besmirched look. Every door handle has its film of black coal-smoke. The Chicago river had the same terrific smell that only a native can endure. State street is blocked off at the river awaiting completion of the fine new bridge whose construction the war has halted. This forces traffic to double up on adjoining streets during the rush hour. But the relatively small number of autos in use relieves the situation.

The canyon-like narrow streets in the main business district are as gloomy as ever despite lavish use of neon signs. No parking at any hour of the day or night is allowed on many of them.

Many help-wanted signs are on display as the manpower shortage hits the big city.

Prices seemed very reasonable on merchandise. Meals are high and food quality poor, however. The best meal I have had since leaving home was in Cheyenne, Wyoming. And it (Continued on page seven)
