Constitution For Pioneer Association

lect and preserve material of historical character, especially that relating to the history of Coos and Curry counties; to obtain narratives and records of pioneer families and their experiences to the end that they may be preserved for future use in the publication of a history of Southwestern Oregon.

Article III. Membership. Section 1. The membership of this association shall be of two classes - regular and associate.

Section 2. Regular members only shall have the privilege of voting in the meetings and shall consist of pioneers who have filed the application for membership, who shall pay the dues as set forth in the By-Laws of the association and shall have resided in Coos and/or Curry Counties for a period of 40 years.

Section 3. Associate members shall consist of interested friends who desire to cooperate in the maintenance and activities of the association and who shall have filed their application for membership and paid the dues for such membership as set forth in the By-Laws of the association.

Article IV. Application for Membership. Application for membership shall be made upon a blank provided by the association and shall be signed by the applicant and filed with the Secretary of the association and shall be accompanied by one year's dues.

Article V. Dues. The dues of this association shall be in such amount and paid in such manner as may be provided for in the By-Laws of the association.

Article VI. Officers. The officers of this association shall be a President, a Vice-president, a Secretary, Treasurer and a Board of seven Directors, two of whom shall be chosen from Curry County and five from Coos County, each to be elected at the Annual Meeting and serve for a period of one year or until his successor has been elected and qualified.

Article VII. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting provided written notice of the change shall have been given to the officers at least thirty days prior to such meeting.

COOS-CURRY PIONEER ASSOCIATION BY-LAWS

Article I. Meetings. Regular meetings of this Association shall be held annually on the last Sunday in July of each year at 10 a. m. at such place as may be designated by the Association in regular session assembled. Special meetings may be held at any time and place upon call by the President and Secretary.

Article II. Quorum. A quorum for the transaction of business at regular meetings shall consist of 25 members present. A Quorum for the transaction of business at a meeting of the Board of Directors shall consist of five members present.

Article III. Duties of Officers. The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings of the Association and its Board of Directors and be directing head in the affairs of the Association. The duties of the Vice-president shall be to perform all the duties of the President in the absence of that officer.

Article IV. Committees. It shall be the duty of the President upon taking office, promptly to appoint the following committees: Finance, Arrangements for Annual Meeting, Membership and Welfare, and such special committees as the members in session assembled may direct.

Article V. Dues. The dues of this Association shall be in the amount of \$1.00 per year, payable in advance to the Secretary-Treasurer.

Article VI. Order of Business. The order of business for all regular meetings shall be: Roll call of officers and directors, Reading of minutes of preceding meeting, Reports of Committees.

Article VII. Amendment. These By-laws may be amended by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting or any special meeting called for such purpose, provided, ten days' notice of such special meeting has been given in writing to the officers and directors of the Association.

Three Rural Schools Have Been Closed

To Conserve Teachers

At least three less rural teaching positions will be open next year. These have been brought about by the following: Remote has suspended its district and will transport to Bridge.

Laurel Lake suspended and will send the pupils to Langlois where their last year's teacher, Mrs. Wanda Volck, will become principal of the grade school.

Lee has discontinued schooling the children in their own building and plans sending them to Myrtle Point.

The Millington school will run with only three instead of four teachers, as the 7th and 8th graders will be in attendance at the Marshfield school.

Two other districts may also vote to suspend and thus make available two other teachers.

The Bancroft school which was suspended last year is planning to re-open school next fall, because of the extremely early hours that children have to leave home in order to connect with the bus.

Non High Budget Hearing

The Non High School Board will hold a hearing on the Non High School budget on Wednesday evening, July 14 in the court house in Coquille.

This budget was compiled by the budget committee on May 12. It calls for a levy identical with that called for in the budget last year. The amount is \$88,322.88. The total estimated expenditures calls for \$108,922.88.

The Non High Board desires to make certain that the district be established on a permanent cash basis and if it is necessary to do so may increase the levy at time of final hearing. This will depend largely on the amount received from delinquent taxes, etc.

The year 1942-43 is the first time since the formation of the Non High District in 1932 that the latter has ever been on a cash basis and this has been only at times.

When a new district is formed it operates for several months before it receives any tax funds. This together with the fact that the transportation and tuition costs have increased has made it most difficult for the Non High District to get on a cash basis, in spite of the fact that the board has each year taken advantage of the six per cent increase.

The Floras Creek school district, No. 39, Coos county, was officially placed under the custody of the District Boundary Board by the action of this board at a meeting on Monday, June 21. The money in the hands of the clerk, Alfred Schmidt, will be turned over to Charles Stauff, county treasurer.

This district had a census of less than six for a period of two years. The law requires that when this condition exists that the District Boundary Board proceed as in the above mentioned manner. If sufficient children do not move into the district during the next three years, the school will be abandoned and the property will be sold.

This district, according to stories which have been brought to the county superintendent, Martha E. Mulkey, has a unique history. In 1914 the few families in Floras Creek determined that they would have a school. The site was located at an elevation beyond the road. The women of the district dragged the lumber up the hill for the building. At the time of the Bandon fire in 1936 the little building was burned. It was then replaced by another crude little building which was used for only a few years.

The valuation of the district is very low being now only \$13,975.

Others helped in the distribution of Keep Oregon Green posters, bag bags, and other literature.
