Trying To Save Indigents' Property

Dr. R. F. Milne, reappointed by the governor as chairman of the Coos County Relief Committee, put a proposition up to the county court on Monday which the county could well afford to accept.

There are 500 elderly people, past 65 years of age and unemployed, on the county's relief roll; and some of them own their own homes but are delinquent in tax payments. Several of those homes are in the recently published list of tracts to be sold at the July 10 sale by the sheriff—that is, this coming Saturday.

The relief committee cannot increase payments to these elderly persons by more than \$3 a month and if they are dispossessed they will have no place to go.

The suggestion which Dr. Milne made was that the county court order these properties removed from the sale and that each month the \$3 be applied toward the debt owing the county for taxes.

The matter was referred to District Attorney Flaxel for a decision on the legality of such a procedure and the county court's decision awaits his opinion.

Besides Dr. Milne and the three members of the county court on the relief committee are Mrs. Meyers of Marshfield and Mrs. E. E. Watkins of Arago.
