Test Holes For Coal Being Drilled

Drilling for coal deposits has been under way in Coos county for several weeks now, under the program previously announced, and for which the national, state and county governments have budgeted \$140,000.

At Riverton 24 holes have been drilled to a depth of more than a score of feet, on a 5 acre tract and coal was definitely found. This is no surprise for Riverton coal has been used in Coquille for years and years.

Other points at which test holes are being drilled are or Kentuck-Slough, the Southport and the South Slough areas.

Unemployment Compensation Commission Personnel Reduced

Claims and contribution divisions of the State Unemployment Compensation Commission are being consolidated this week into one field unit as a manpower economy measure for the duration of the war. About 40 field deputies will take claims at 22 local employment offices and also will secure wage reports and taxes from about 9000 covered employers. Claimants now number under 200 a week and are expected to be fewer as the season advances.

"Because of continued resignations occurring regularly, no employees will be laid off as a result of this move," explained Silas Gaiser, administrator. "We are simply trying to use our trained field workers more effectively. This basic organization may expand either way as conditions may dictate after the war."
