**4 Contests Open To 4-H Club Members**

Four national 4-H club contests are now available to any active club member who can qualify. The contests, however, are arranged to make awards possible to county and state winners as well as national, according to James F. Bishop, assistant county agent.

"Feed a Fighter in '43" is the slogan for the victory garden contest. Members growing good gardens will be interested in entering this contest.

Increasing meat production is the object of the meat animal contest as well as to study methods of decreasing losses and wastes caused, for the most part, by disease, parasites, and improper handling.

A national rural electrification contest is available to those enrolled in regular 4-H work. It is not necessary to be enrolled in an electrification project.

The object of the safety activity contest is to find every possible danger point about the house or farm and remove it.

Participants for county awards must be bona-fide 4-H club members working under the supervision of the Extension Service and enrolled during the current year.

For state and national honors, members must have passed their 14th birthday on January 1, 1943, and must have completed at least three years of 4-H club work, including the current year.

According to Mr. Bishop all those wishing to enter any one or more of the contests should send their names to the County Agent's Office immediately as contests must be completed by October 1, 1943. Additional contest information and material will be supplied upon request.
