Election of officers for the coming year gave the convention to Gertrude Niles of Marshfield as chairman; Helen Kimble of Bandon, vice chairman; Louise McArthur of Marshfield, Secretary; Alma Coffindaffer of Marshfield, treasurer. The next convention will be held in Marshfield.

The Unwritten Work Contest was held, with the participants being Noble Grands, Bernice Clark, of Coquille; Bernice Smith, of Myrtle Point; Gussie Anderson, of Marshfield; Winifred Fish, of Bandon; and Mabel Finney, of Powers. It was won by Noble Grand, Finne.

A count of the attendance for the afternoon showed North Bend 6, Powers 10, Bandon 12, Myrtle Point 14, Marshfield 15, Coquille 22, and from other jurisdictions 7, making a total attendance of 86 for the afternoon.

The annual banquet was served at 6:30 in the I. O. O. F. dining room by the ladies of the Coquille Canteen Corps and was well attended. Everyone commented on the fine appearance of the Corps ladies and the wonderful dinner they served. The tables were decorated in red, white and blue, with colored tapers and sweet peas, and place favors of tiny red and blue wheelbarrows holding white popcorn. Table decorations were in charge of the Past Noble Grands Club, of which Florabel Boober is president.

After the dinner the convention again assembled in the lodge hall to rest a moment and admire the beautiful decorations which had been placed there before the convention by the members of the Sewing club and their president, Louise Clark.

The evening session was opened with a tribute to the past chairman and other past officers of the convention. This was a drill beautifully done by ten young daughters and granddaughters of Rebekahs, including Leota Neely, Laura Emily Ruble, Mary Ann Walker, Joyce Benham, Alene Hunt, La Donna Neely, Barbara Davidson, Arlene Kellenberger, Betty Clark and Sharon Larson. These girls, lovely in their floor length dresses, carried arm bouquets of pastel hued flowers which during the course of their drill they presented to the past officers.

Mamie Rebekah Lodge of Coquille again opened the session, as it was their regular meeting night. Assembly officers and visitors from other jurisdictions were introduced by the committee from the home lodge, Edith Gruenewald, Ida Oerding and Florence Hallock, who presented the officers with old fashioned bouquets. President McCollum claimed the honor of presenting Brother Parent of Ferndale, California, who is on leave from service in our country's forces.
