Joe Sayre's Sister A Jap Prisoner

Miss Geneva Sayre, sister of Joe Sayre of Coquille and Attorney Paul Syre of Portland and who has been a missionary for many years of the Free Methodist church and stationed in the Honan province in China, has been sent to a Jap concentration camp at Wehsien, Shantung province, according to word received by her parents, County School Superintendent and Mrs. E. A. Sayre, of La Grande. The word came through authorities of the church.

Miss Sayre had been held as a Jap prisoner, with certain liberties for a good many months, in her home province. She had been doing missionary work in China for more than 20 years and at the time she was taken by the Japs, was doing hospital and evangelistic work.

Miss Sayre visited her brother and family here in 1938.
