Air Raid Practice Tonight

In order to improve the usefulness and efficiency of the Air Raid Practices which are held every other Thursday in Coquille, Chief Bill Barrow has called a meeting of all Air Raid officers for tonight, Thursday, July 29, at the city hall at eight o'clock. All Incident Officers, Zone Chief, Control Board Workers, District Wardens, Chiefs and Members of Police, Fire, Ambulance and Messenger Services are particularly urged to be present.

At the meeting it is proposed to discuss ways and means for improving the regular practices and lay plans for ensuing practices.

It is the purpose of the Air Raid Precaution Service to increase the responsibilities and scope of the Block Wardens. Each Block Warden is urged to display the Block Warden Insignia in the window of his home, to make himself known to each householder in his respective block, to keep himself posted as to number of people in each house in the block and know at all times any condition of sickness or helplessness in any home in the block. Each householder is urged to know his block warden and feel free to consult with him or her at all times.

The Air Raid Precaution Service feels that it is highly desirable for each block and each zone in town to be as nearly self-sufficient as possible and not to depend too much on relief from central sources in case of disaster. The purpose of the meeting tonight is to bring about this condition as nearly as it is possible to do so.
