

### Ben S. Fisher Talks At Rotary

Ben S. Fisher, attorney of the Radio Corporation of America of Washington, D. C., former resident of Coos county, gave a very interesting talk to the members and guests of the Rotary Club at their noon luncheon meeting at the hotel Wednesday.

Speaking of Washington, he said it was a city of confusion, that the constantly changing heads and personnel of the various alphabetical departments made for difficulty in getting anything done and that we should be grateful that things on the war front were in so much better shape than on the home front.

One thing, he stated, that did not make for orderliness was the vast increase in population in the past two or three years due largely to the added bureaus and consequent increase in government employees.

He gave a description of the new Pentagon Building which he said covers twenty-two acres of ground space and houses between forty and fifty thousand government employees. It has twelve cafeterias and a fully equipped hospital and is occupied principally by war department employees.

The building cost seventy-five million dollars against the architect's estimate of twenty-five million and is located across the Potomac river in Virginia.

Mr. Fisher said we did not realize how fortunate we were to be living on the coast. He said when he left Washington it was 98 degrees, in St. Louis it was 98 and in Oklahoma, where he went to visit his son, it was 98 and that the humidity was very high.

Mr. Fisher was accompanied west by his wife and daughter.

### Intrigue, Romance Top "Assignment In Brittany" At Roxy Thur., Fri., Saturday

M-G-M's "Assignment in Brittany" brings Helen MacInnes' poular novel to vivid life in a thrilling story of espionage, an amazing masquerade and a tender romance at the Roxy Theatre, where it will be shown Thursday, Friday, Saturday. It serves to introduce to American screen audiences Pierre Aumont, brilliant French actor who while serving with the French army figured in many outstanding battles and won the Croix de Guerre before the Nazis overran the country he escaped from.

Aumont plays a British secret agent who poses as a French poulu, Bertrand Corlay, whom he resembles. He goes to the impersonated man's village to hunt for the secret hiding place of the German U-boats. In his masquerade he meets Corlay's sweetheart (Susan Peters), with whom he falls in love. He learns that Corlay is mixed up with the attractive Signe Hasso, who turns out to be a Nazi spy. After a series of incidents in which he risks his life, he locates the submarine nest and manages to get word to the Commandos. In a dramatic raid, the Commandos blast the nest to smithereens.

Aumont glories in his role which closely parallels his real life experiences. Susan Peters performs a difficult role with dramatic power and Miss Hasso is arresting as the feminine spy. Richard Whorf, Aumont's first enemy, later turns out to be his comrade and gives a finely balanced

performance. Other principals include Margaret Wyehery, Reginald Owen, Miles Mander, Sara Padden, John Emery, George Coloursis, Darryl Hickman and Juanita Quigley.

Jack Conway, an experienced hand at direction, blended thrills with heart interest, and Charles Rosher's photography is unique. Lennie Hayton provided the music score which lends an effective and dramatic touch to the picture.

### Midsummer garden plates

Now's the time of year to take a careful look at the fresh vegetables on the market, for varied menu inspiration. The ways you can serve these garden treats are almost limitless—and they do wonders for lazy appetites.

### COMBINATION SALAD PLATE—

A whole meal on one plate! Arrange shredded greens on large plates. Lettuce, other salad greens, or crisp, raw spinach may be used. In the center of each plate, place large tomatoes hollowed out and filled with chopped egg, meat or chicken salad. Around the tomatoes, arrange a circle of chilled, cooked peas, then another circle of sliced, pickled beets. Pass the salad dressing separately. Hot cheese biscuits or toasted cheese sandwiches are delicious with this. And custard or pie fits in well for dessert.

### MIDSUMMER PLATTER—

At one side of a large, heated platter, place pastry shells filled with creamed, sliced, hard-cooked eggs and peas. In separate groups place mounds of sauteed, shredded cabbage, broiled tomato halves and broiled fresh peach or apricot halves. Serve with toast or crackers, and follow with a fruit bread pudding.

### HOT WEATHER SALAD PLATE—

Place in separate lettuce cups a generous serving of potato salad, chopped spiced beets and cottage cheese, and cooked, green string beans. Garnish with cucumber and carrot strips. Serve your favorite dressing separately, and pass a plate of oven-hot muffins. Apple pie and cheese will polish this meal off.
