**Sewage Disposal Plant To Be A Post - War Project**

Mayor Wood and four councilmen—Burr, Gray, Pettit, Purkey—were present at the opening of the city council's mid-month session Tuesday evening, and Dr. Stark came in later. The most important matter to come up was in regard to what the city will do toward relieving unemployment after boys, now in the service, come home.

The discussion was started by a letter from the Post War Readjustment and Development Commission at Salem in regard to what Coquille plans in the way of public works.

Discussion centered on sewer extension and the installation of a sewage disposal plant, the estimated cost of which was given by City Engineer Gearhart as being \$168,000. The city attorney was requested to investigate and inform the council if the cost of this installation could be met by assessing all water users a specified amount each month and whether the matter would have to be put up to a vote or could be done by the council without a popular vote.

Engineer Gearhart, reporting on the improvement need along the south side of the Watson House, stated that a fill and bulkhead there would be very expensive and he recommended that a wooden sidewalk be laid up the hill on Front street, east from Hill.

The street committee approved Rod Creager's application for a "no-parking" sign between the Thornton Tire Service plant and the Pacific Feed & Seed store on Front street.

Two-hour parking on Second street, between Taylor and Willard and on Moulton, between Second and Third, was a new schedule adopted by the council with instructions to the police to enforce the order.

A card room license was granted W. H. Fortier for Bill's Place.

Chief of Police Creager was instructed to sell several raincoats which were purchased for the use of the Police Reserves last winter and which are now deteriorating. The Reserves are not now on duty at night.

The application of Messrs. Russell and Reed for the removal of trees from Beach street, between Sixth and Seventh, and for the grading and graveling of the block was referred to the street committee for investigation.

An appeal was made to the owners of the private water system on Sanford Heights to turn in the numbers of the water meters sold to the city and also to present a bill for them.
