Letter From Wally Moore At Farragut

Mrs. John A. Moore this week received a letter from her son, Wally, who is in training at the Navy camp at Farragut, Idaho, which tells more about what the boys do there than any letter the Sentinel has been permitted to print heretofore. Wally was a Coquille High graduate last May.

We get Sundays to ourselves so I have lots of time to write letters to-

day. I tried out for first-class swimming yesterday and I made it. We will get different colored sweaters for our class of swimming when we get into the fleet. There are three classes and about eight of us made first class. I just tried out for it for fun; I didn't think I could make it. Before I was through, though, it ceased to be fun. I got so tired my legs felt like they were asleep and I could hardly maneuver around. We had to swim 220 yards, swim under water 50 yards, break a stangle hold and carry a man 50 yards for

life saving, and tread water for about ten minutes while we took off our clothes and made life preserver out of our pants. It sure is slick the way they do it. Now that I am a first class swimmer I can go swimming any time I want to. Non-swimmers and first class swimmers are the only ones who can. We help instruct the non-swimmers.

I'm beginning to like it here better all the time, that's more than I can say for anybody else here in this camp except for a few. Most of them hate it. I'm sure glad I have the job of squadron leader, 3/class petty officer because none of this seems so bad to me. I passed my strength test already. This test has to be passed before you can graduate. I passed it in our first test. Our C.P.O. said we would graduate six weeks from Tuesday; that won't be long. I'm going to try to get in the Medical Corps. We had our tests for mentality the other day and get our interviews Monday. I think I did all right on it. I hope so because they sure talked me into the Medical Corps. I can even get in the Dental Corps if I'm lucky after I go through all my preliminaries. I wouldn't need so much college then to be a licensed dentist. That would mean I would be helping my country and not wasting my own time.

We've got our worst shots over now. That makes us feel a little more like old salts. It made a few in our company pretty sick; they couldn't eat anything. A lot of them had fevers and splitting headaches but I got by pretty lucky. My arm—just got sore and swelled a little and that was all. I guess our company pulled through them pretty good because they say that after those shots every company has somebody come down with scarlet fever.

I've sure met and made friends with a lot of kids in our company. Most of them are just out of high school like me.

I don't know about my horns yet, I can sure get in an orchestra any time when we get out of detention and I guess I will get in the band then, too. There's a kid here from San Francisco in our company who would be playing with Benny Goodman now if he hadn't been drafted. He has set in with all the big name bands. He's over in his bunk now beating on a practice pad; you can tell he's good.

Robert W. McGilvery, C. H. S. graduate of a few years ago, surprised his mother, Mrs. Marie McGilvery, by walking in on her last Thursday evening. He has been stationed at Treasure Island for the past six months and is a Navy radio technician, first class, an advance in rank which Capt. Hale B. Eubanks says is very unusual in so short a time.

"Bob," as he is known to his friends here, will leave for his station tomorrow and anticipates that his ten days leave precedes his assignment to duty aboard some vessel in the Pacific.
