About Posting By Retailers Of Ration Point Values

Retailers of processed foods and rationed meats, fats, oils, and dairy products may take one full business day to correct posted ration point values for individual items, following a change in official point values.

The one-day lag in altering point values, which is recognition of the time and work required to change postings, also applies to wholesalers and primary distributors who display rationed foods for sale at retail.

This change does not permit a delay in the posting of the current OPA Official Table of Consumer Points Values, which must be displayed in a conspicuous place as soon as it is effective. The one-day delay is limited to point value for the individual commodity, which must be marked on the package or posted on or near the shelf where the item is kept.

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
