### Albert Maiden Hears From George

A letter received yesterday by Albert Maiden was sent to his son, George, taken prisoner on Wake Island in January, 1942, when the Japs captured the civilians working on the islands as well as the service men.

The letter was evidently written last January and was sent to the mine near Holland, Ore., where George and his father were working before he went to Wake. It was forwarded from Holland.

Mr. Maiden has the same general opinion that most people will have when they read the following letter, that the Jap praise was included to make sure the missive passed the censors there:

Shanghai War-prisoner's Camp  
George Maiden  
Barracks 4, Section 5

Mr. Albert Maiden  
Holland-Oregon  
Dear Father

Just a few lines to let you know I am still alive and in good health. I have been in China one year the 24th of this month and haven't heard from any of you folks yet. Due to the kindness of the Japanese officials and the International Red Cross we had a most enjoyable Christmas and New Years. If possible please send me a pair of good shoes with composition soles—size 6½ and wool socks, cigarettes and tobacco. Tell all the family and friends hello and give

them my best regards. My only hope is that you are all well and happy and that I will soon be with you again. I am getting along fine and am in good health and spirit. I look forward to hearing from you and hope you all had a Merry Christmas and I wish you a Happy New Year.

### Paul Walker, Jr. Now On U. S. Sub

Paul W. Walker, 19, seaman 1/c, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Walker, of Seattle, Wash., but formerly of Coquille, has completed basic training at the Submarine School at New London, Conn., for duty with our growing fleet of undersea fighters.

Seaman Walker will be entitled to wear the twin dolphin insignia of the submarine service after further experience aboard a submarine during which he must demonstrate to his commanding officers that he is fully qualified to carry out the duties of his rate. The insignia is regarded as a mark of distinction throughout the Navy.

Walker attended Coquille High School, lettering in football and active in track. After entering the naval service in January, 1941, he went to San Diego, Calif., for recruit training and has served at sea. He has been commended for rescue and salvage work.

The Submarine School, the only one of its kind in the Navy, is attended by a picked group of men who must pass special physical, mental, and

psychological tests.

The school work takes place not only in classrooms and laboratories, but also in numerous training submarines in which students master the actual techniques of operating the powerful fighting craft.

Many students at Submarine School already have seen battle as members of surface ship crews before volunteering for submarine duty. Others are fresh from training stations, but all graduates are sure of action once they are assigned to a submarine due for offensive patrol. Large numbers of recent students now are serving in submarines which have sunk enemy naval or merchant vessels.

### Wasley Laird Graduates From Marine Reserve Officers School

Second Lieutenant George Wasley Laird, 26, of Coquille, was scheduled to be graduated from the Marine Corps Reserve Officers School yesterday at Quantico, Virginia. After completing his advanced officer instruction he will then be ready for duty at a specialist school or a combat organization.

Lieutenant Laird won his gold bars last spring after being graduated from the officer candidates class. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Laird and the husband of Mrs. Lurene Laird, of Bullards Route, Coquille.

### L. E. Haynes Of This City Is Now An Army Captain

Mrs. A. N. Foley has received word from her son, L. E. Haynes, who is and has been for some time stationed in Washington, D. C., that he was recently promoted from a first lieutenant, in the Army to a captaincy.

### Chas. Thommen Has Had Experiences

Charles Thommen, the Fairview boy, who is home on leave from the Navy while awaiting assignment to another vessel, has had a lot more experience in the past ten months than most rural boys see in a life time.

While on duty in a convoy in the Pacific last November, the vessel he was on was hit, but not sunk, by a Jap destroyer.

Then recently his vessel was hit and sunk by a Japanese sub and he was one of the 25 per cent of the crew saved who escaped.

Julia says—  
Get youngsters to make lunches and they'll eat 'em

Let the youngsters put up their own lunches!

They take pride in the importance of the work. They know the food will be what they like, not just something "Mom thinks is good for them."

It's surprisingly easy. Here's the way we do it, at our house:

- The evening before a school day, after the dishes are done, my two youngsters and I decide on what will go into tomorrow's lunch.
- The youngsters get all the necessary lunch "fixings" together.
- They arrange the bread so that each slice is next to the "partner" it fits.
- They spread each slice with a stiff silver knife (if butter is scarce one side is spread with dressing or a sandwich spread), covering the bread clear to the edge so it won't be dry eating.
- They spread the fillings, making them at least one-third as thick as one piece of bread.
- They cut the sandwiches in any one of a number of ways; for instance:

- They carefully wrap each sandwich in waxed paper, so it will be fresh and tasty the next day.
- They pack their lunches in paper bags, being careful to put such heavy items as oranges and apples in the bottom of the bag, and the more fragile sandwiches on top.
- They then put their lunches away in the refrigerator or other cool place, and clean up whatever mess they've made.
