Frank Martin reported that the awkward squad of which he was to be commander for the celebration on July 5 did not materialize because the Legion was requested to carry the colors in the parade, therefore the awkward squad was promoted to color bearers and color guard.
Clair Gray reported that the division of the proceeds of the Chuck Luck game at the Fourth celebration, after equally splitting the pot with the community building, netted the post \$56.70.
