Fatalities From Jaywalking On The Increase in Oregon

Jaywalking, the practice of crossing streets between intersections, is on the increase in Oregon, a survey made by the safety division of the secretary of state's office disclosed today.

This unsafe practice was reported in 166 per cent more pedestrian fatalities during the first six months of 1943 than for the same period of 1942. Eight persons were killed while crossing streets between intersections during that period this year, compared to only three for the comparative period a year ago.

Pedestrian fatalities have increased a little over 40 per cent so far this year, while other types of traffic fatalities are showing a downward trend, the safety division's survey showed.

Indicative of the fact that increased numbers of pedestrians alone is not responsible for the increase in deaths, the division reported that unsafe walking practices were factors in 80 per cent more pedestrian accidents this year than a year ago. Of the walkers killed in traffic so far this year, 64 per cent were engaged in unsafe actions at the time they were struck while last year, only 35 per cent were so engaged.

Unsafe practices, in addition to jaywalking, were crossing streets against red traffic lights, stepping into the street from between parked cars, walking along the right-hand side of the road instead of on the left, facing approaching traffic, and failing to carry white or display a lighted flashlight while walking at night.

Reduction Plant Saves Only Chrome

Out on the Oregon coast highway between Coaledo and Coquille, and opposite the John Yoakam farm, is a government industry managed by the Southwest Engineering Co. of Los Angeles, under the direction of their superintendent, R. W. Clarke.

This is the reduction plant which handles chrome concentrates from the Humphries Gold corporation and the Krome corporation black sand mining about seven miles west of the reduction plant, from which mines trucks are delivering to the highway industry concentrates during every hour of the 24 in a day.

This activity, reduction plant and the mines, hold out promises of heavy royalties to Coos county, which owns a major portion of the land being mined. The royalties, however, have not commenced coming, for, according to Supt. Clarke, no shipments of chrome have been made. Mr. Clarke said when shipments start, the concentrates at the plant he manages, will be directed to points the government directs.

While the chrome corporation was operating its laboratory there was said to have been several other metals discovered in the concentrates and

it was possible these would be saved.

Supt. Clarke, discussing this possibility, says that the reduction plant management has nothing else in mind excepting to save the chrome in the heavy deliveries of concentrates. While admitting there may be some zircon in the sands, Supt. Clarke says they are giving it no attention and are saving only the chromium--Coos Bay Harbor.
