Penney Stores Beat Bond Quota By 400%

Secretary of the Treasury Henry J. Morgenthau has just telegraphed the J. C. Penney Company congratulations on the magnificent job of bond selling which the company's 1610 stores turned in during the month of July. In July, 1942, the Penney Company sold 8½ million dollars in War Stamps and Bonds to set a high record for the chain and department store business. This year, in an attempt to surpass the 1942 figures, a quota of ten million dollars was set. The complete report for July, which was forwarded to the Secretary of the Treasury last week, announced the amazing total of \$42,335,816.85, or four times the quota set for the campaign, and very nearly five times the figure of the preceding year. In this one month, Penney stores sold 25 per

cent more in bonds and stamps than in merchandise. In terms of war equipment, this means 500 fighter planes, 200 light tanks, five destroyers and five submarines.

News of this July achievement, together with the Secretary's telegram of congratulations, were released at a time when the Penney Company was engaged in an all-out endeavor to go over the top again this September in the Third War Loan Drive.

While the Company average of Bond sales for July amounted to 125 per cent of its merchandise sales, individual stores and individual states turned in far greater percentages.

State's 4-H'ers To Take Active Part In Fire Prevention Week

Through their National Farm Safety Program, practically all 4-H club members in the nation's largest volunteer youth organization—which now totals 1,700,000 rural boys and girls—are being urged to take active part in the 1943 Fire Prevention Week, which will be held Oct. 3-9, by presidential proclamation.

That the 4-H'ers are helping to reduce the annual farm fire losses of 3,500 lives and millions of dollars in now irreplaceable buildings and equipment vitally essential to the war program, is reflected in the clubber's records of achievement in the current National 4-H Farm Safety Activity.

Among the aims of the program are to impress others to become safety conscious to locate fire hazards and correct them, and to assist in providing or installing simple home fire-fighting equipment in or near all farm buildings. The youthful workers have made big strides in carrying out these objectives since the activity's inception last January, by giving talks, demonstrations and playlets on accident and fire prevention at local meetings, by inspecting home premises for accident and fire hazards, and conducting community-wide safety campaigns. Their safety activities have called for extraordinary efforts this year, due to the large number of inexperienced workers on farms.

Records of all participants in this activity are being considered for special recognition in the form of county, state and national awards provided by the Bennen Company. They include medals to county blue award groups, and a \$100 War Bond to the outstanding safety champion in each state. An all-expense trip to the 22nd National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, Nov. 28, Dec. 1, and a \$200 scholarship also will be presented to each of the four members of the national blue award group selected from the state winners.

Coal Rationing Started Monday

A priority system on coal deliveries—to assure a fair distribution of the available supply according to the need of consumers—went into effect last Monday, Sept. 20, in Washington, Oregon and the ten northern counties of Idaho.

"This is the same area now under firewood priorities and the coal priority system will operate in the same manner," James C. Scully, regional fuel rationing executive, Office of Price Administration, said yesterday. The action on coal was taken by OPA at the direction of Howard Gray, Deputy Solid Fuels Administrator for War under Harold Ickes.

The firewood rationing order which has been in effect in this same area since July 28, has been revised to include both wood and coal and becomes a new ration order No. 14-A, Roscoe A. Day, acting chief of the Northwest Solid Fuels Rationing Branch of OPA, explained.

"It was necessary to add coal to the rationing order because of the uncertainty of the coal supply for this area," Day said, "the shortages of fuel oil and wood have placed a heavy burden on coal, necessitating action to protect coal users."

"Multiplied war requirements, both military and industrial; greatly increased population; shortage of manpower at all stages of production and distribution; and the acute transportation problem, both rail and truck, have cut coal supplies in the face of a soaring demand," he said.
