

Bob Cats Take The First Game

The Coquille Red Devils will play their first home game a week from this coming Saturday, on Oct. 16, the North Bend Bulldogs being the opponents.

Their first game, played at Myrtle Point last Saturday against the Bobcats, resulted in a 12 to 7 loss for the Red Devils, due to a couple of fumbles in the last quarter when the Cats were putting on a power drive.

Coquille had scored first, in the second quarter, Dave Kline carrying the ball over on a reverse from the T formation.

The score remained 7-0 until near the end of the third quarter when the superior weight of the Myrtle Point boys carried the ball to the Red Devils 20-yard line as the quarter ended.

The two fumbles, early in the fourth stanza, finally put the ball on the one-yard line, from where Sutphin carried it over but the try for point missed, leaving the score 7-6 in the Devils' favor.

After more fumbles, two by Coquille and one by Myrtle Point, and with less than two minutes to play, a 12-yard pass, Sutphin to Belloni, enabled the latter to cross the final stripe, and the game ended a moment later, Coquille 7, Myrtle Point 12.

One of the outstanding players on the field was the Red Devils fullback, Hurst, who stopped many of the Bobcats' plunges at the line or back of it.

Fatal Traffic Accidents Increased In September

Traffic accidents claimed a life for every day during the first 26 days of September, Secretary of State Bob Farrell disclosed today in warning Oregon citizens that traffic fatalities already were 30 per cent ahead of the death toll for the entire month of September last year.

Of the 26 persons killed in traffic by September 26th, four were pedestrians, two of whom were young children. There was one bicycle fatality, two grade crossing deaths, ten deaths from motor vehicle collisions, seven from non-collision accidents and two from motor vehicle collisions with fixed objects.

September is the first month of 1943 that the traffic death toll strongly exceeded that of the corresponding month of 1942, Farrell declared. March of this year recorded one more death than March of 1942, while in January and August, the death list was exactly the same as a year ago.

With the advent of fall, traffic hazards increase due to slippery streets and inclement weather, Farrell pointed out. Thus, as Oregon enters the most critical period of the year, so far as traffic accidents are concerned, the state has the worst record of any month this year.

Greater observance of traffic regulations, reduced driving speeds and consideration of the rights of others will enable the state to hold down this traffic toll, Farrell said. He urged drivers and pedestrians to cooperate in keeping traffic in Oregon safe.
