### Letter From D. V. Yeoman In Wash.

R. E. Connarn this morning received the following interesting letter from D. V. Yeoman, formerly of Fairview, Wash., for over a year, as an engineer in a government war plant.

He writes in part: I have been working as an engineer since last July and have (believe it or not) withstood the keen competition and gone up three times since signing up here.

If anyone had told me two years ago that I would pay the income tax I have been glad to pay, I would have said he was plain nuts. Looks like I will be here another year unless my health breaks and I weigh 170 now. I am on the heavy end of the work as layout engineer and like it.

We get the Sentinel and a week ago the Mrs. tried to talk me into wiring you to buy, beg or steal the electric washing machine that was advertised in the paper. I waited too long as it was not in this last week's paper. One cannot purchase anything like that here and we need one very badly. Five of the engineers here with me are very anxious to get most any kind of a washer that we all can use for the duration.

If you could, in your spare time, run across one in good shape, grab it and I'll wire money for purchase, crating and shipping to us here.

Seems a year since we have been home and I guess we are homesick for Coos county but we are going to be very busy for the duration.

Our son, Carl, is on foreign duty as master sergeant with Signal Corps and at last report O. K.

Betty is still at Boeing's in Seattle and doing real well. We go into see her as often as we can get away.

I drive 120 miles round trip each day to work. Housing is just terrible. We have a company house coming up in next 30 days at Richland, 27 miles from our field office.

Distances are terrible here in the desert. I haul my crew in a jeep and believe me it takes a jeep to negotiate these desert roads.

Our only company out in the desert are jack rabbits and rattlesnakes. Pleasant pals, I'll say.

Had dust storm today and drove in from work with lights on to keep from being run down by other cars and trucks. Our office is at Hanford, Wash., on the Columbia river above Pasco.

Give our regards to old friends and remember the coke is on me when we meet.

### Can't The U. S. Exclude The Japs?

Under a Washington date line the following appeared recently in a daily paper and its reading makes the blood of every true American boil. It's time those in authority came to know that there is really no such thing as a "loyal—to the U. S.—Jap." The item was as follows:

Revelation that Japanese-Americans released from war relocation centers are buying land and settling in a rich region of eastern Oregon, today brought bitter protest from Representative Lowell Stockman, Republican of Oregon.

He declared the discovery probably will mean a full-strength alliance of the Oregon House congressional delegation with the California and Washington delegations toward the discharge of all top War Relocation Authority officials and a complete reform in W. R. A. policy.

Representative Stockman said that in Malheur county, Oregon, Japanese-Americans have bought farm land which the district had expected would be settled by young Oregon farmers who are now in the United States fighting forces.

The area is just outside the coastal strip barred to Japanese by the Army.

"Japanese fresh from the relocation centers have moved into the areas surrounding the towns of Vale, Ontario and Nyssa to such an extent that they have additionally burdened restaurant and other facilities which already had been hit severely by war shortages," Stockman said.

"Resentment is rising in the district, which has made an unusually heavy contribution to the armed forces."

"It is a rich section and, in normal course, the American youths now in the armed services would return there, marry, take up the land and develop a great community. That is what the people there have looked forward to."

"Now the whole section stands in danger of being ruined by Japanese encroachment through the encouragement and assistance of a fatuous New Deal agency."

"The Japanese are being given every assistance in converting property so they can buy the land, and I am sorry to say that the chance of profit has led a few real estate men to deal with them."
