Coquille Red Cross Notes

Coquille Red Cross, 704, will hold its regular weekly meeting on Friday, Oct. 29, from 1:00 to 4:30 o'clock in Guild Hall. As usual there will be work provided for everyone—machine and hand sewing, knitting, crocheting, cutting, pressing, filling sewing kits, etc. Please bring your own scissors and thimble and because it is now impossible to purchase crocheting hooks in Coquille, it is suggested that you bring for your own use or to lend to another. Nos. 1, 2 or 3 crocheting hooks are used.

Because so many afghans are now under way, colored yarn is badly needed. Also needed are more large-eyed needles, large safety pins and 10, 11 and 12 in. squares cut from old Turkish towels for wash cloths.

Mrs. D. B. Kesner, chairman of production, says, "We will continue to make afghans but because they consume so much yarn, (all of which must be donated), and because it is also necessary to fill our quotas on regulation items, we shall work on them chiefly at our meetings and we also ask our women who are now working on them in their home to please accept some sewing or knitting at the same time. After all we do want to do the things that are most needed for our service men first."

Kit bags and housewives (sewing kits), are still the most essential items and Mrs. Phil Alborn, chairman of knitting, is concentrating all possible on placing stumps, toe and regular sox in the hands of her knitters, in addition to the sweaters and gloves now under way. Mrs. Alborn is most enthusiastic over the manner in which new knitters are coming to the front.

The appeal for new workers is meeting with a generous response and Mrs. Kesner is pleased to report that Mrs. G. E. Stark and her former group of workers have again

taken up Red Cross sewing.

"We thank the following women for contributions of yarn, needles, safety pins and heavy slipper material: Mesdames Jas. Richmond, Bean, R. A. Jeub and Don McCune. We also wish to thank Mrs. Dorothy Bishop for repairing another sewing machine and for her offer to continue to keep our machines in repair.

"If you are not yet doing some type of Red Cross work, we hope you will come and work with us on Friday or call at our work room for sewing or knitting to take home. Our congenial gatherings are proving that work can be fun. One of our workers was heard to say at our last meeting that since a recent visit from a nephew who had been in actual combat in the Solomons, she realized now more than ever before how very necessary Red Cross work really is.

"Coquille Red Cross, 704, hereby extends its gratitude to members of the vestry board of St. James' Episcopal Church, Guild ladies, and to the Rev. Robert L. Greene, vicar, for their generosity in allowing us to meet regularly in their hall for the duration, with no expense to our unit," says Mrs. Kesner.


