Letter From Sterling Gruenewald

Sterling Gruenewald, now stationed at the Naval Air Technical Training Center at Norman, Okla., writes his former employers here, Mr. and Mrs. Fred R. Bull, about his service experiences, since joining one of Uncle Sam's service group several months ago, as follows:

Time goes plenty fast, especially in this base. We have eight or nine hours of class and shop work and an hour of physical fitness drill during the week. We have liberty three Sundays a month but we have eight hours of guard duty the fourth weekend.

The day before we left Astoria about half of the "boots" were given a chance to request the type of school they wanted to attend. I asked for aviation mechanics but they decided to send me to Memphis, Tennessee, to take a fourteen-week course in aviation radio. However, ten minutes before I left I learned that I was to be sent here to study aviation mechanics after all. Consequently, I am taking a twenty-one week course in it. I have at least sixteen weeks to go.

During the first several months after this base was commissioned a year ago, every graduate was given a third class rate. After that everyone with grades in the top half was rated but now we will wait for our rate until after we have been assigned to a squadron unless we are in the top ten per cent.

This is one of the most worth while schools available to us. Graduates are qualified to receive a commercial engine mechanic license and by taking a course in welding, we can get a commercial airplane and engine license, so we can't lose.

How is life in Coquille? I thought I would come down before I left Astoria but our semi-monthly liberties weren't quite long enough and no leaves were granted when we finished training. What are Eagles doing? I found some other members here but they haven't been able to locate a lodge in Norman or even Oklahoma City, which is only twenty miles from here.
