The meeting was held at the Hotel Osborne. Three hostess clubs were Eugene Fortnightly Club, Eugene Monthly Book Club and River Road Women's Club. Six counties were represented: Benton, Coos, Douglas, Lane, Lincoln and Linn. Mrs. Ray Paffer, of Corvallis and district president, presided over morning and afternoon sessions. Mrs. O. C. Sanford, past state president of the Federation, was the luncheon speaker and gave an inspirational talk.

The three objectives of the conference were, first, recruitment of nurses; second, recruitment of Waves, Waes, etc.; third, "Buy a Bomber" campaign for November. Resolutions and Objectives
The resolutions and objectives report was presented by Ben Huntington, superintendent of the Bandon school. Other members were Dr. Edmund A. Cyckler, Riverton, and Wayne Smith, Coquille. The report was accepted by the teachers and is given in detail below:

The resolutions and objectives committee of the Coos county divisions of the O. S. T. O. submit the following resolutions for your consideration:

Be it resolved— That we heartily commend the State Association for its aggressive action and urge all personnel of the school to consider it their privilege and duty to become members of their professional organizations to the end that the state organization may assume a still more aggressive attitude. In turn we urge the O. S. T. A. to associate itself with those other groups in the state with which it can work to the end that it may have greater influence toward educational advancement and increase the professional strength of our organization.

That Education Week be stressed to the point where the community is made aware of the fact that the school is the social factor in the community.

That teaching of the basic fundamentals is the primary function of our schools. And further, that those fundamentals take precedence over, but provide for the specialized training that is apt to follow the public school education.

That the efforts previously expended in the various war activities such as rationing, bond and stamp sales and purchases, salvage drives, etc., be continued to an even greater degree as the occasion arises.

That as a group we become more conscious of the fact that juvenile delinquency is one of the major problems confronting the schools as is evidenced by the increase in juvenile crime in Coos county as well as elsewhere and that a co-operative effort between the school, home, church, other organizations and juvenile authorities must be forth-coming in order to alleviate this problem.

Parents Asked To Visit The Schools

Coquille schools are stressing American Education Week, November 7 to November 13, according to Burton W. Dunn, local school superintendent.

Parents are being urged to take greater interest in the educational life of their children and to visit their schools to get first hand knowledge of the manner in which they are conducted.

The following is the text of a letter which is being sent to parents of all school pupils, soliciting their cooperation in activities of American Education Week:

"Education for Victory" is the watchword in the schools of America. National Education Week, November 7 to November 13, is a good time for all parents to give some serious thought to emergencies which are facing our schools today.

One hundred thousand teachers have left the classroom to enter the armed forces and industry since Pearl Harbor. Extra duties have been taken over by the schools in pre-induction training and other war emergency work. Many smaller schools have closed their doors and larger ones are facing teacher shortage.

Axis nations made use of the powers of education as one of their first war activities. Education of America's children cannot wait until the war is over. Teaching is war work just as surely as building bombers. The consequences of teaching today will carry on in the years to come. Education plays a major role in building the future.

It is our joint responsibility to see that America's schools are kept at a high level of efficiency.

Tuesday, November 9, is parent visitation day in the Washington, Lincoln Junior High, and High schools of Coquille. You are especially urged to fulfill your part in National Education Week by coming to school with your boy or girl on this day to witness a day of normal classroom procedure.

West'n Union-Postal Merger In Effect

A merger of the Western Union and the Postal was authorized some time ago by Congress. The stockholders of both companies then also authorized the move.

The West Coast Telephone Company has been operating as an agent for the Postal Telegraph Company. The rates charged by us were rates established and filed by the Postal Telegraph Company. The Western Union is assuming the agreement and all obligations formerly existing between the Postal and the Telephone Company with the exception that all telephone offices, controlled by the West Coast Telephone Company operating along the Oregon Coast from Gardiner, Oregon, to Trinidad, California, where telegrams are accepted, have been quoting and charging Union rates starting at midnight Oct. 20. Routing of telegrams and all operating procedures are to remain otherwise unchanged.

Considering geographical location of this district and the distribution of facilities, the rates to be charged may in some instances appear inconsistent with charges formerly in effect. The low rate charged, with increased operating expenses was a contributing cause for the merger. Where rates appear inconsistent the companies will make every effort to adjust such differences just as soon as possible.
