HERE ARE OFFICIAL RECOMMENDATIONS AS PUBLISHED BY THE OFFICE OF WAR UTILITIES, WAR PRODUCTION BOARD.

General Conservation

- (a) Turn off lights and appliances when not actually needed.
- (b) Eliminate unnecessary use.

Residential

- (a) Eliminate all waste in the use of various electric appliances, such as refrigerators, radios, space heaters, ranges, water heaters, etc.
- (b) Turn off lights and appliances when not actually needed.

Exceptions

The Committee wishes specifically to direct attention to the fact that no effort should be made to curtail necessary military, aviation and police lighting, lighting essential to public health including eye-sight conservation and safety, plant protection, transportation, and protection purposes.

As outdoor recreational activities are considered essential for wartime morale, the use of electric energy necessary for this purpose should not be discouraged.

Naomi Long Dies At Port Townsend

The following from a Port Townsend, Wash., paper tells of the death of a former Coquille girl who left here several years ago with her parents:

The community was shocked Tuesday evening at the announcement that Miss Naomi Long, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Long, who was stricken at her home two weeks previously, had died at St. John's Hospital. She was 28 years of age. Death came at 7:30 p. m., at a time when her anxious friends were confident she had passed a crisis in her illness, and was recovering.

Funeral services were held at Port Townsend last Friday afternoon and interment was in a Port Angeles cemetery.

Miss Long was born in Sequim April 8, 1915, was a graduate of the Sequim grade school, then moved with the Long family to Port Angeles where she graduated from high school in 1933. She was a member of the Rainbow Girls. The Long family moved to Port Townsend in 1933.

Surviving Miss Long are her parents and a brother, Robert, also of Port Townsend.
