Top 4-H'ers in Oregon Win Trips to National Club Congress, Chicago

OUTSTANDING records of achievement in 4-H wartime production and conservation projects, conducted by the Extension Service, have won state championship honors for six Oregon club members. As a reward, each will receive an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 28-Dec. 1. The six trip winners are:

MARIAN COFER, 17, of Portland, is the state's highest scoring participant in the 1943 National 4-H Canning Achievement contest, for which Kerr Glass Mfg. Co. provides the awards. During 2 years in club work, the girl put up 2,444 quarts of meats, vegetables, fruits, soups and jellies, and won many prizes on her exhibits.

ALICE ROBERTS, 17, of Salem, receives the Montgomery Ward trip award for her "all around" 4-H girls' record. During 2 years in club work, she sewed and remodeled 24 garments, prepared 158 meals, including 229 diets, made 5 home improvement articles, and canned 1,620 quarts of food, as well as completed 34 projects, and served 5 years as assistant leader.

SARAH ANDREWS, 17, of Portland, is given the Chicago trip by the Educational Bureau of the Spool Cotton Co. for her superior record in the current National 4-H Clothing Achievement activity. The girl made over or mended 14 of her own and family's old garments to help save vitally needed new cloth and labor for military uses, as well as crocheted and knitted accessories for her wardrobe.

Thirty-five college scholarships, totaling \$7,000, provided by the same donors, are awarded the national winners in the above contests.

BETTY SETTER-GREEN, 17, of Gresham, receives her award from American Viscose Corp. for having the top ranking record of planning, selecting, constructing, assembling and caring for her wartime wardrobe in the National 4-H Victory Dress Review. This program encourages participants to dress appropriately, healthfully and economically for all occasions.

DALE BURNER, 17, of Portland, wins top honors in the Westinghouse 4-H Rural Electrification contest for his exceptional ability in utilizing electric power for time- and labor-saving purposes on his farm. His 3 year 4-H record shows that he has made an electric chick brooder and an egg candler; also did wiring and repair work.

ERMA KUENZEL, 17, of Salem, state winner in the National 4-H Food Preparation Contest, is rewarded with the coveted trip by Berkey home economics department for her exemplary record in helping to "Make America Strong." She contributed immeasurably to the war program by making the greatest possible use of home-produced food, and preparing 23 camp cooking articles, and 2,283 dishes and hangings for her family.
