Lumber Grading Class At The Bay

The Marshfield Vocational school announces the opening of a new lumber grading class beginning December 14. Anyone is eligible from 16 years of age both men and women—it is particularly beneficial if you are already working with lumber. This class will meet twice a week on Tuesdays and Thursday, from 7 p. m. to 9 p. m. Instruction in the rules of lumber grading as compiled by the West Coast Lumbermen's Association is given by Ivan Neely, who is a registered inspector of the Pacific Lumber Inspection Bureau.

This is the third class of lumber grading and is given in response to the large number of requests received by the school. The class must be limited to forty persons due to the limited facilities. However, although this class started this week, any one can register up until the night of December 21.

Additional gas for those living out of town who wish to attend this class has been available in the past and we have found the ration boards very co-operative. Due to the Christmas rush of business, registrations are coming in slowly and those interested are warned that December 21 is the deadline. If at this time there are not enough students enrolled to keep the class in session it will have to be discontinued. Many of the students who have completed the other courses have found this class very helpful. You discuss the rules and also have actual experience grading moving timbers.
