**California Says Good Oil Prospect**

A daily paper news dispatch from Sacramento, Calif., has the following to say about the prospects for oil development in Coos county and the well being drilled on Davis Slough for the Phillips Petroleum Corporation:

The possibility that oil may be found in Oregon in addition to four unexplored fields in northern and southern California was held out today by Carlyle F. Lynton, executive officer of the state lands commission. Lynton said the Phillips Petroleum company of Oklahoma is drilling an exploratory well directly east of the Coos bay area, and if proven, will mark the first time oil has been found in the state of Oregon.

"There is every indication that oil can be found in Oregon," Lynton observed, "as the area is rich in coal and tar deposits and because of the general topography."

He disclosed that S. W. Griffith, chief of the Oregon state land board, had conferred with California officials on this state's lease forms and royalty formula in anticipation of oil being found in Oregon. Oregon, Lynton said, wishes to be in the position of being able to advertise for bids on oil leases on Oregon public lands in case oil is brought in.

Current drilling, now down about 3500 feet, is located 15 miles from Coquille.

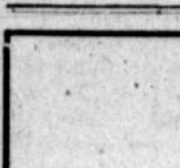
