Rats Show Proper Nutrition Benefits

An object lesson in the value of proper nutrition is being presented beginning Monday, Dec. 27, in the windows of Farr and Elwood's in Coquille by the Coos County Nutrition Committee under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy E. Bishop, home demonstration agent. Three pairs of rats were obtained from Oregon State College and for the past three weeks have been fed proper and improper lunches. The correctly fed rats are strong and healthy with glossy coats, while the others are thin, weak and irritable. During part of the feeding period the rats have been cared for by the girls health classes at the Myrtle Point High School under the direction of Mrs. Neva Church. The rats created much interest among the students.

Exactly the same results as noted in the rats will take place in humans—the only difference being that it takes much longer, often years, for the results to show up. The daily lunch must furnish one third of the daily food requirements for a well balanced diet. In packing the daily lunch or selecting it over the lunch counter, Mrs. Bishop suggests that the following foods be included.

Milk—In food or drink.

Bread—Whole wheat or enriched. In sandwiches, puddings, or meat loaves.

Meat or cheese or eggs or fish—in sandwich fillings, salads or hearty main dishes.

Fruit—at least one, plain, or in salads or puddings.

Vegetables—At least one, in sandwich fillings, salads, or in hearty main dishes.

Teachers of Coos county who wish to make use of the rats in teaching their nutrition classes may make arrangements to borrow them, states Mrs. Bishop.

The rats will be on display in other parts of the county early in January.

The subject discussed was "Food Substitutions in War Times."
