Coquille Red Cross will meet on Friday, Jan. 7, from 1:15 to 4:15 p. m. at Guild Hall.

"We are now about to begin a new year of Red Cross work," says Mrs. D. B. Kesner, chairman of production, "and we are particularly anxious to welcome a number of new workers as well as our regular standbys, at this meeting as we expect to start work immediately on new quotas for both knitting and plain sewing and additional help will be required if we are to complete them promptly."

"We are pleased to report that the new knitting consists of turtle-neck sweaters, watch caps and gloves for the Navy. Up to the present we have knitted exclusively for the Army."

"We will also have on hand cut-out articles for machine sewing but have not as yet been advised what these items will be."

"Those women who are now working on hospital shirts are asked to kindly complete and return them as quickly as possible as Coos county headquarters are anxious to ship all that are now outstanding."

"We shall, of course, continue to work on the ever popular afghans, crocheted wash cloths, and the new type of crocheted slippers as well as the old-style machine-sewed scuff slippers."

"Anyone having a spare crochet hook, size 1, 2, 3 or 4, especially, is urged to lend it to the Red Cross for working around wool squares, as these cannot at present be purchased. Can still use 10, 11 or 12 inch wash cloths, colored cotton thread for edging, colored yarn and wool for afghan squares."
