John Wesley Dugger, a resident of the Coquille valley for half a century, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Laura Walker, at Broadbent where he has made his home since the passing of his wife in 1940, last Friday at the age of 83 years, 3 months and 19 days, a ripe old age for kindly courteous and gentle old pioneer.

Mr. Dugger was born in Johnson county, Tenn., Sept. 18, 1860, and when he arrived in Coos county he settled on Fishtrap. He was one of the employees of the original Johnson sawmill, three miles out on the Myrtle Point road.

Besides his daughter he is survived by a nephew, Cecil Dugger of McKinley, and a niece, Mrs. Beulah Bricker of Portland.
