Warnings against the evils of growing federal control and administration of education were sounded at the American Association of School Administration conference held in Seattle January 10, 11 and 12, says Burton W. Dunn, local school superin-tendent, who attended this war-time conference on education.

National educators strongly favor federal support of education but they believe administration of federal funds should be channeled through the regular administrative control

within each state. Pending bills in the United States Congress, S 637 and H. R. 2849, authorizing an appropriation of \$300,-000,000 annually, to equalize the educational opportunities in public elementary and secondary schools should receive greater attention and support than we are now giving them, according to William G Carr, secretary, Educational Policies Commission, National Educational Associa-
