heating, the library board would have to cut down on books and magazines and other services if the library had to pay such heating bills and stay within the budget.

Mr. Sanford was assured that the city would see that the budget was not overrun on that account, and it is probable that a radiator will be placed in the auditorium, along the library wall, that its heat may help in the library.

The furnace and plumbing of the Community Building have just been installed but the heating units for the various rooms have not yet arrived. However, there is now more or less heat throughout the building and it is certain the interior woodwork will suffer no further deterioration.

J. L. Smith, who has for several years used a portion of the land east of the reservoir, and which has recently been acquired by the city, as pasture for a few head of stock, was given permission to continue using it. The pasture is separated from the reservoir by a fence which Mr. Smith maintains.

Engineer Gearhart was instructed to survey an additional acreage, 30 to 40 acres, of government-owned land up there which the city needs to acquire complete control of the Rink creek water shed. When the survey is completed application will be made to the government to have the tract set aside as a reserve for the city's control.

In order that he may have police authority at the high school, on nights when there are games or attractions out there, Frank F. Schram was deputized as a member of the police department and a star is to be issued him. The request for such action was made by Chief R. H. Creager. The curfew ordinance discussion appears elsewhere in this issue.

Four Plead Guilty In Circuit Court

Harlan Dale Stanley and George David Smith, the former from Crescent City and the latter of Coquille, who had been bound over to the grand jury by Justice Fred Bull ten days previously for the robbery of Martin Clausen near the depot, waived grand jury investigation in circuit court on Tuesday and pleaded guilty before Judge Dal M. King, who sentenced each of them to seven years in the pen.

Sheriff Howell, accompanied by A. O. Walker, took them out to Salem on Wednesday.

Two young men from the Myrtle Point district also pleaded guilty Tuesday to larceny of six turkeys from A. E. Boren. They had been bound over by Justice E. A. Dodge at Myrtle Point.

Mr. Boren stated that the boys were neighbors of his and asked Judge King to be as lenient with them as possible and the boys said that had they known the fowls belonged to Boren they would not have touched them. The judge gave them each a sentence of four months in the county jail and then ordered their immediate release on parole for a two-year period.

Proposed Curfew Ordinance Will Give Police Authority

(Continued from Page One)

prohibiting the persons having the legal care and custody of such minors from permitting or allowing violation thereof; providing penalties for violation thereof, and repealing all other Ordinances in conflict therewith, and declaring an emergency.

THE CITY OF COQUILLE DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person under the age of eighteen years to be upon, loiter, wander or stroll upon any street, alley, park or other public place in Coquille, Oregon, at night after the hour of 10:00 o'clock P. M., unless such person is accompanied by a parent, legal guardian or other adult person, lawfully and properly accompanying such minor person.

Section 2. That it shall be unlawful for any parent, legal guardian or other adult person, having the legal care and custody of any minor person under the age of eighteen years, to allow or permit such minor person to go upon or be upon any street, alley, park or other public place in Coquille, Oregon, at night after the hour of 10:00 o'clock P. M., unless such minor is accompanied by a parent, legal guardian or other adult person, lawfully and properly accompanying such minor person.

Section 3. That any police officer or other law enforcement officer is hereby authorized and empowered by virtue of his office, to take charge of any person under the age of eighteen years violating any provision of this Ordinance and it shall be the duty of any such officer, so taking charge of any such minor persons, to take such minor person to the Police Station and to thereafter immediately notify the parent or guardian or legal custodian of such minor person of the violation of the terms of this Ordinance, and to notify such parent or legal guardian or legal custodian that said minor person will be held in custody at the Police Station until said parent, guardian or other legal custodian can come to the Police Station to get said minor persons, and said minor person shall then be held at the Police Station a reasonable time pending the arrival of said parent or legal guardian or legal custodian.

Section 4. That it shall be unlawful, and shall be considered a separate offense under this Ordinance, for any parent or other adult person having the legal care and custody of any person under the age of eighteen years, to fail or refuse to come to the Police Station and take such minor person in custody immediately upon being so notified by the Police Department.

Section 5. That any parent, guardian or other adult person violating any provision of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or be imprisoned in the City Jail for not more than ten (10) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the municipal judge; that any minor person under the age of eighteen years violating any provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars.

Section 6. That all Ordinances of the City of Coquille in conflict herewith, be and the same hereby are repealed.

Section 7. Inasmuch as the provisions of this Ordinance are necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City of Coquille, Oregon, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage by the Common Council and its approval by the Mayor of the City of Coquille.
