

Fishing Regulations Made By State Game Commission

Final action regarding the 1944 ngling regulations was taken by the Oregon State Game Commission when it met in Portland on January 29.

Effective February 1 will be the new regulations on steelhead and salmon over 20 inches in length. In the coastal streams the bag limit was five fish a day, but now the limit in all sections will be three fish a day or nine in any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time. There will be no bag limit, however, on jack salmon under twenty inches in length.

The six-inch trout season will open on April 15 and close October 31. The bag limit remains the same as before, 15 fish or 15 pounds and 1 fish in any one day but not to exceed 30 fish or 30 pounds and 2 fish in any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

The special season of June 1 to October 31 on the upper part of the North Umpqua was abolished and this section of the river, therefore, will be open to winter fishing for steelhead over twenty inches.

A few other changes were made in some of the county regulations which will be listed in the official synopsis of angling regulations that will be available for distribution some time in March.
