"We have been able to purchase outing flannel locally," says Mrs. D. B. Kesner, production chairman, "and this will be cut out and ready for distribution at this time. We shall continue work on the pieced wool quilt we are making as well as the afghans, which are now to be made larger—the finished afghan to measure 4 ft. by 5 or 6 ft. The four-inch squares may still be used or, if preferred, larger squares may be used. We are also informed that we may use heavy cotton or mercerized in place of wool yarn to crochet around edges, when yarn is hard to get.

"All 'Navy' knitters are asked to please return completed work before March 1. We still solicited clean wool pieces, bright colored yarn, turkish wash cloths and colored mercerized cotton.

"We are grateful to Mrs. Edith McNelly for five very original, as well as beautiful, afghans, made and donated; also to Mrs. Ralph Taylor for her generous contributions of colored yarn.

"Upon receipt of a request for a pair of warm heavy gloves received by Mrs. Mabel Winnegar from her son, now interned in a German prison camp, Mrs. J. A. Berg and Mrs. Ruth Candlin immediately got busy, knitted the gloves and sent them off.

"We should like to see a good attendance on Friday. Visitors are cordially invited to come and see the work we are doing.
