### Wayne Goodman, Twice In So. Pacific, Home On Leave

Wayne Goodman, U. S. Navy, who has now served two stretches of service in the South Pacific, recently returned from his last one, and arrived in Coquille Friday night on leave. He expects to be here until Feb. 20 and will receive a new assignment when he reports back to San Diego.

Wayne was a star athlete on Coquille High School teams a few years ago and people here would be very glad to hear about some of the things he has seen and done, but when questioned he obeyed naval regulations and did not tell anything.
