Long Session Of City Council Monday

(Continued from Page One) power to act, provided the necessary electrical equipment could be secured. A resolution adopted by the council provided for the issuance for a deed to Keith and Louise Leslie for the three lots at Tenth street and the highway, on the corner south and across the street from the high school. Four years ago Coos Securities had completed payment on these lots to the city which had taken them over for delinquent street assessments, but the deed which had never been recorded had been lost, and the lots had now been transferred to the Keith Leslies. Another tract, 100x100 feet, on Spurgeon Hill, adjoining the West-brook place, was sold by the city when the council accepted the offer of \$328.14 by Gerald McClure West-brook. The amount includes what the city has invested in the property and the taxes now due on it. Another resolution approved was that cancelling the contract of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Sandall for the purchase of two lots on Knowlton Heights. They had paid a quarter down and \$15 on the lots a few years ago and have now written they will not go on with the contract. One subject on which the councilmen aired a lot of views was the proposed curfew ordinance. One councilman was opposed to "insulting" youngsters by forbidding them to loiter on the streets after ten o'clock at night and another, while favoring a curfew hour, thought the age limit should be 16 instead of 18. Upwards of an hour was spent in the discussion, much reiteration coming time after time, and the upshot was that action was postponed for two weeks when it is hoped to have the Scoutmasters and Mr. Hughes, who is to be in charge of the Boys' Club, present to get their viewpoints on whether the police should be given authority to send children home, those who are simply loitering about town. Another matter, brought up by Councilman Pettit, was in regard to monthly inspections of business properties and the elimination of fire hazards. Mr. Pettit's suggestion was that the fire chief, who is by virtue of his position a deputy state fire marshal, should name a fireman or firmen, to make these inspections, their time to be paid for by the city. When their reports are made, one copy to the property owner, the other would be handed to the police whose duty it would be to see that the orders to abate nuisances or hazards are obeyed. Considerable discussion was had with Elmer E. Benham, who is preparing to buy the garbage truck which "Shady" Howell has been operating, and make a contract with the city for collecting garbage. Until the contract and lease of the dump grounds east of the city are signed, it cannot be stated just what the weekly or monthly charges are to be, but they cannot be higher than the maximum charges heretofore in effect for they have been established as ceiling prices when they were filed with the O.P.A. As soon as Mr. Benham and City Attorney Berg get the terms of the agreements drawn up, a special session of the council will be held to act upon them. One point at issue Monday evening was whether Mr. Benham would pay the \$40 per annum which the ordinance now requires for the franchise, or whether the ordinance would be changed to a nominal \$1.00 a year fee.
